league championship. Steady pitching by Heather McEachern, who hurled all seven innings and tremendous hitting against two tough Omagh pitchers Leanne MacKinnon and Heather Eves helped the "poolers" wrap up the championship. The game was close for three innings with Acton

holding a slim 7-5 lead, but Wally Ella and Pat Van Der Eyken gave their club a pep talk and they responded by scoring seven runs in the fifth inning and nine more in the sixth. Right fielder Anna Swinkels was the top hitter for Acton with three safeties. Gayle Deforest had two hits

and Debbie Brown, Kim McCristall and Kim Van Der Eyken one apiece. Sue Lehn and Kim Van Der Eyken both drew four walks as well. In the field Carol Jordan showed a lot of hustle in right field and Sue Lehn did an excellent job behind the plate. Heather Eves stroked three hits in five trips to the plate in

a losing cause for Omagh, who finished second behind Acton during the regular season. The girls celebrated their win with a happy visit to the nearest drive-in restaurant and they'll be honored further when they receive their championship trophy at the league banquet this year.

Last chance hockey sign-up set for Saturday morning

Less than a quarter of the number of boys who played minor hockey in Acton last winter showed up to register for the 1974-75 season at the first registration held in the arena Saturday morning. The second and final registration will take place at the arena this Saturday morning between 9 a.m. and 12 noon and officials emphasize that parents should be aware of the importance of registering this week. Of the 116 boys who registered last week, close to 20 are new residents of the area. More new faces are expected to appear this week and players will be accepted on a first come first served basis. Last year total minor hockey registration in Acton was 417. Registration fees are \$10 per boy for the novice, atom and peewee age groups and \$12 per boy for the bantam, midget and juvenile age groups. An unfortunate error in advertising for the first registration listed the bantam fee at \$10, but it is actually \$12. Players are welcome in the novice age group anywhere from 5 years old up to 8. Atoms are 9-10 year olds, peewees 11-12, bantams 13-14, midgets 15-16 and juveniles 17-18. Boys wishing to try out for the Waterloo-Wellington League rep teams may do so when ice is available in October. Practice notices will appear in the Free Press. Players making those teams will be asked to pay a small additional registration fee at that time. This year's fees of \$10 and \$12 represent a very small increase over last year's figures of \$8 and \$10. They are still well below many other towns in the area. Parents in Milton are facing an outlandish fee of \$28 per boy this season.

Sabres open camp in Georgetown September 23

Acton Sabres will open training camp for the OHA Junior "C" hockey season at Georgetown Memorial Arena, Monday night, September 23 at 10. Sabres have also booked an hour of ice time in Georgetown, Tuesday and Thursday of the same week and Monday, Tuesday and Thursday of the two subsequent weeks. Coach Dave McKnight, who'll be back at the Sabre helm for his second season and Bill Campbell, who has succeeded Lou Bonnette as manager are inviting all boys of junior age in the area to attend the camp. Although the OHA has increased the junior age limit by one year, meaning that all members of last year's club are still eligible, coach McKnight emphasizes that no positions on the team are sewed up and that all prospects will get a fair chance. Sponsorship of the team has been generously taken over this year by the Mississauga-based Mobile Materials Handling firm of Joe Gardlin.

An ardent Acton hockey supporter who lives on 25 Sideroad, near the Fifth Line of Nassagaweya, Craig Weldon will return as assistant coach and Milt Ball will assume the duties of assistant manager. Sabres are expected to play in a six team group along with Alliston, Schomberg, Stayner, Bradford and Penetang. Fergus has apparently decided to join another group and that may be confirmed at a pre-season league meeting in Alliston tonight (Wednesday).
