

Margaret and Stephen Lister travelled to Cambridge Fall Fair to show Sonny, a horse owned by J. Walsh of Acton. This horse placed second in Green Working Hun-ter, and fifth in three other classes: Green Working Hunter (a second class); Hunter Hack; and Hunter Stake. They also took Black Label owned by W. Yundt and J. Walsh of Acton, who placed fifth in the Open Working Hunter and Handy Hunter

Jennifer Lister rode for three days at Maple to finish fourth in the Junior Training Division in the Ontario Three Day Event Championships riding Scarlet Fever.

1. Have your heating system cleaned and inspected by an expert, regularly.

2. Locate thermostat on an inside wall, 5 feet from floor. Save heat by turning it down 5 degrees at night. Storm windows or insul
