Acton coaches benefit from OHA clinic

Three hockey coaches from Acton, Jim James, Ken Hearn and Bruce Sears were among 100 from across the province who attended a special OHA clinic held at the Lord Simcoe Hotel in Toronto last week to coincide with the Team Canada-Soviet Union hockey series.

Highlight of the two day clinic was attendance by all participants at last Wednesday night's practice of the Soviet Union National team at Maple Leaf Gardens prior to Thursday night's second game of the series. Coaches sat in the stands and observed as Soviet head coach Boris Kulagin put his players through a workout that lasted more than an hour and featured complicated passing drills. Following the workout,

Konstantin Loktev, assistant coach of the Soviet Nationals answered questions for members of the group.

Father David Bauer, former coach of the Canadian National team, Dr. Bob Hindmarch of the University of British Columbia and Hank Akervall of Lakehead University were among the guest lecturers at the clinic.

"The information we received at the clinic was invaluable," Jim James told the Free Press. "Ron Smith and Murray Child of the OHA staff did a super job of organizing it."

James said he was most impressed with a lecture delivered by Father Bauer on the purpose of sport and how it can be used to help make a more complete boy or man.

CAHA President Jack Devine was guest speaker at the Thursday evening banquet which concluded the clinic. All participants were then given tickets for the Team Canada-Soviet Union game that night.

Jim James coached the Intermediate "B" Acton Tigers in the '70-71 season and Acton midgets in the '72-73 season. He now coaches the Halton Hills Comet team which represents the Christian Reformed Churches of Acton and Georgetown.

Hearn will return for his fourth season as coach of the Acton juveniles this year and Sears has been named to coach Acton midgets after a successful stint with Legion 4-town peewee teams.

60 prospects at Sabre camp

More than 60 prospects including 11 goalies hit the ice at Georgetown Memorial Arena, as the Acton Junior "C" Sabres training camp opened Monday night.

Coach Dave McKnight and assistant Craig Weldon had so many boys to choose from that they split the group in two for further sessions to be held last night (Tuesday) and tomorrow (Thursday) night. Sabres also have ice booked in Georgetown on the same nights for the next two weeks.

Meanwhile, Sabre executive members were summoned to a meeting in Barrie last night (Tuesday) to discuss the possibility of allowing Huntsville and Bracebridge into the Central Ontario group which now

includes Acton, Alliston, Bradford, Penetang, Stayner and Schomberg.

Sabre officials understandably were opposed to the move, because of the travelling which would be involved. Bracebridge and Huntsville were left without a league when teams in Sundridge and Powassan folded this year.

The result of last night's meeting is not known, but the move was expected to meet strong opposition from more teams than Acton.

Intermediate hockey back

AHS nips Milton in cross-country tilt

Acton High's boys and girls cross-country teams both defeated Milton in their first meet of the season last Wednesday.

Acton won the boys event 18-19 with Frank Houston leading the way with a second place finish in an excellent time of 15:38. Simon Joyines of Milton, one of the best young runners in Ontario placed first in 15:36. Both Joyines and Houston busted the old Acton

course record.

Other scorers for Acton were Les Jones third in 18:34, Randy Young sixth in 18:24, Steve Stanley seventh in 18:43 and Lee Robinson eighth in 18:50.

The AHS girls won a very close race by the score of 18-18. In any cross-country race the first four runners on each team count for the team score. If a tie should result, the fifth runner on the team

breaks the tie. In this race Acton's fifth runner Cindy Klenderters finished ahead of the fifth Milton runner.

Winner of the event was Acton's Heather Neve in a new course record time of 11:27. Anne Smith of Acton was third in 12:38, Teresa Luty of Acton sixth in 13:52 and Rhonda Spenser of Acton eighth in 14:19.

The AHS boys team has been weakened this year by

the loss of Glen McKenzie and Rodger McEachern who have both graduated and accepted track scholarships at Miami of Ohio and Scott Somerville who has decided to discontinue running.

Nevertheless with Frank Houston and Les Jones leading the way, the Redmen could still be a threat to retain their Halton high schools senior boys championship.
