Friends, knowing the great disinterest I have in gardening, often present us with large baskets of this, that, and the other fruit or vegetable. And it's all very much appreciated.

There was a time last year, however, that everybody's contribution was carrots, and I had them stored everywhere! But the problems were nothing compared to deciding what to do with the things. After all, most families will eventually get to the point where they'll refuse to even LOOK at a carrot, if it's fed to them three times a day.

By the end of October, I had a great collection of recipes using carrots in a way that wasn't quite recognizable. Here are some of them:

- SWEET AND SOUR PORK CHOPS**  
4 or 6 pork chops  
seasoned flour  
1/2 cup cider vinegar  
1/4 cup white sugar  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
2 Tbsp soy sauce  
1 Tbsp salt  
1/4 cup chopped green onions  
1 green pepper, chopped (optional)  
1 cup shredded carrots  
Dust chops with flour and brown in drippings. Drain off excess fat. Combine vinegar, sugars, soy sauce, and salt and cook to a thin syrup. Add onions and green pepper. Pour sauce over chops, cover, and cook slowly for 1 hour or until tender. Add carrots and cook two or three minutes. Serve with boiled rice.
- CARROT PIE**  
1 cup cooked mashed carrot  
1/2 cup white sugar  
2 Tbsp molasses  
1/2 tsp ginger  
2 eggs  
2 cups milk  
1 tsp cinnamon  
Put carrots in blender or whip with an electric beater.
- WINTER PIE**  
1 cup raisins  
1/2 cup shredded carrot (uncooked)  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 Tbsp cornstarch  
1/2 tsp cinnamon  
1/4 tsp each cloves, nutmeg, and salt  
1/2 cup hot water  
1 cup chopped apple  
Combine dry ingredients and add to the raisins and carrot. Add water, bring to a boil and simmer 5 minutes. Add apple.  
Bake in a two crust pie for about 20 to 30 minutes at 375 degrees.
- GOLDEN TEA BREAD**  
1 1/4 cups flour  
1 tsp soda  
1/2 tsp each of salt, cinnamon, nutmeg  
2 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup corn oil  
1 tsp vanilla  
1 cup coarsely grated carrot  
1/2 cup raisins or nuts  
Sift together flour, salt, soda, cinnamon and nutmeg. Beat together eggs, sugar, oil and vanilla. Add carrots and raisins. Stir into dry ingredients mixing only until all ingredients are moistened (about 20 strokes). Turn into a greased loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 60 minutes or until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean.

# Toronto girl wins pony

Suspense is over and local little people who'd hoped to see the dappie gray pony of the Lions Club draw stuffing this year's Christmas stocking, know now it won't ever be.

Sunday's draw of the toy horse went to Donna Gordon of Toronto. Donna's city street address was not included on the ticket stub, only her telephone number. The ticket had been sold to the Toronto family by an Acton resident selling tickets for the Lions Club.
