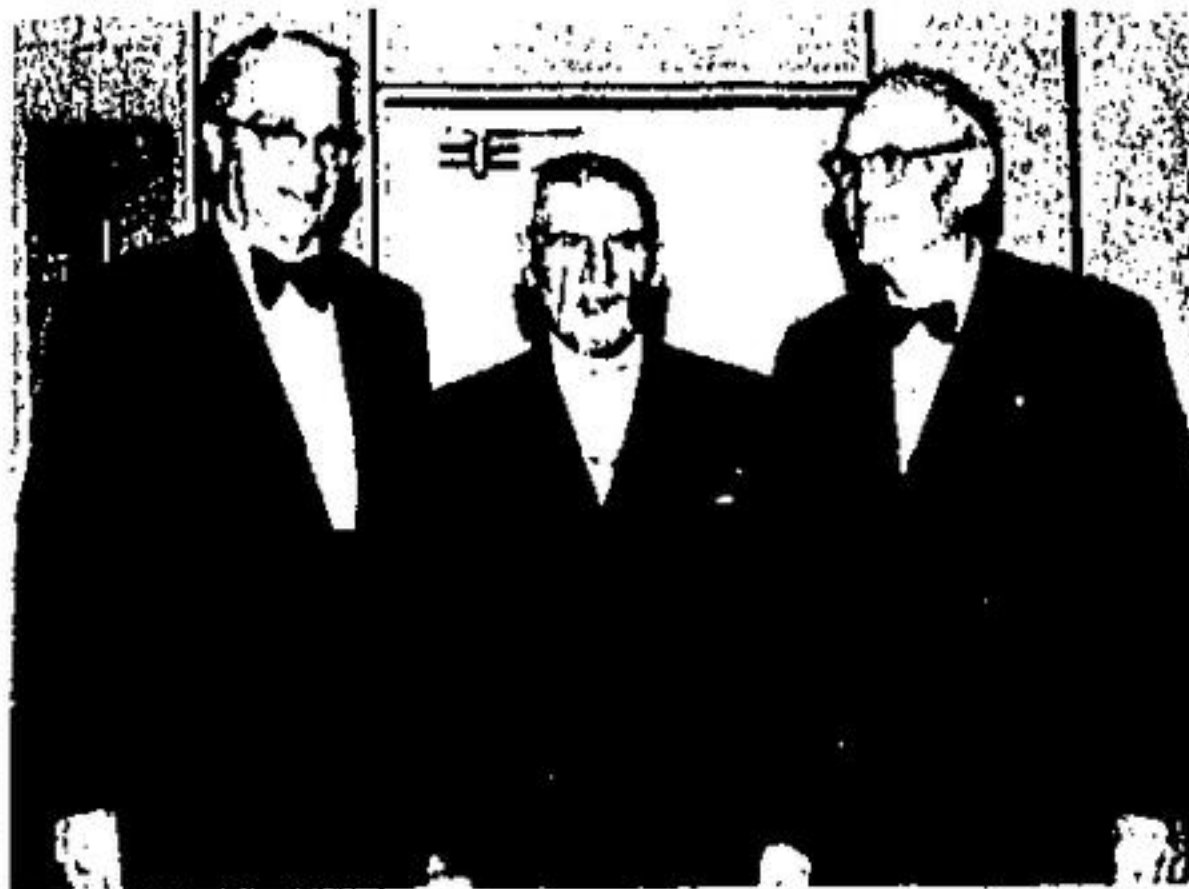

Two lakes 100, 300 acres

Quarry plans to donate reclaimed land to HRCA

A new quarry is in the planning for the Niagara Escarpment in Halton Hills near the Scotch Block Dam and Reservoir. Standard Industries (Consolidated Sand and Gravel) owns the 600-acre property at Speyside and is awaiting approval from the Niagara Escarpment Commission as well as a licence from the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources.

A hearing will be held by the Ontario Municipal Board to have the St. Helena Rd. site west of Highway 25 de-

signed for a quarry operation.

Standard Industries plans a staged program for the removal of the extracted material which would allow the property to be reclaimed shortly after the material has been removed. They have promised to stay 1,000 feet away from the face of the Niagara Escarpment during the operation of the pit and suggest that an exchange of 50 acres take place between Halton Region Conservation Authority and the quarry. HRCA owns 68 acres of adjoining land.

In return Standard Industries would transfer 21 acres of the Escarpment face to the Authority. The 50 acres owned by the Authority would be incorporated into the quarry operation.

Two lakes At the end of 15 years the material would be removed parallel to the 1,000 foot strip

along the Escarpment in such a manner as to create a 100-acre lake. The lake and the reclaimed land would then be transferred to HRCA. This would result in an additional 153 acres being transferred to the Authority.

An additional 35 years would be required to work out the balance of the quarry and build a second lake—this one

covering 300 acres. After the 50-year program ends, HRCA would receive a 670-acre site with two large lakes and a property restored suitably for recreational uses.

Members of the Authority and Escarpment Commission toured Standard Industries' Speyside quarry and operations at Guelph and Paris on Tuesday.
