Few new faces at Raider camp

Very few new faces have shown up at the Georgetown Raiders Intermediate "A" hockey training camp with the OHA Intermediate "A" league opener against Port Colborne Sailors October 18, less than three weeks away. Defenceman Neil Cotton continues to be in charge for the twice weekly workouts at Georgetown Memorial Arena with team President Wilfrid "Toots" Brownlow supervising from the stands. The team has not yet decided on a replacement for coach Gerry Inglis who is the Junior "A" Dixie Bees this season.

Cage league is for men

Confusion resulting from an advertisement in last week's Free Press for the Acton Industrial Basketball League has been cleared up by organizer John Kavanagh. "I had several calls asking whether the league is for men or for women," John reports. The league is definitely a mens league. Players must be 16 years of age on the date of registration which is Thursday, October 3 at the Acton arena at 7:30 or be in at least Grade 10 at school. A maximum of 40 players to form four teams will be accepted. Registration fee is \$30 per player with \$10 of that payable on registration night. Games will be played on Wednesday nights beginning October 9.

Ice probable late October

New boards are currently being installed in the Acton arena and arena manager Harold Townsley expects to start ice making machinery in motion Friday, October 11. "After that it's up to the weatherman how soon we have a sheet of ice ready," says Harold. The arena is not insulated and in recent years temperatures have jumped into the 70s in mid-October just when ice making began.

Industrial hockey sign-up

A second registration will be held Sunday, October 6 at the same time. Players are urged to register early, since applicants will be taken on a first come first served basis. Registration fee which includes ice time is \$45 per player. The league's popularity has increased greatly in recent years. Games are played in tripleheaders at the arena Sunday nights beginning in late October or early November.

Sabres settle for compromise on addition of northern teams

Acton Sabres have reluctantly accepted a Central Ontario Junior "C" hockey league majority decision to allow Huntsville Huskies and Bracebridge Bears into the group for the 1974-75 season. At a meeting in Barrie last Wednesday night the six member teams, Acton, Alliston, Bradford, Schomberg, Penetang and Stayner voted 4-2 in favor of adding Huntsville and Bracebridge. Acton and Alliston were the only teams to vote against the proposal.

"Believe me, we had nothing against Huntsville and Bracebridge having a group to play in," Sabre manager Bill Campbell emphasized. "We simply felt it would be too far for us to travel when more convenient groups could be formed." Team representatives reached a compromise which will not make the increased travelling as much of a problem as it first appeared. First of all, the league has been divided into a northern and southern division.

Penetang, Stayner, Bracebridge and Huntsville will be in the northern division and Bradford, Schomberg, Alliston and Acton in the southern division. The two most southerly teams, Acton and Alliston and the two most northerly, Bracebridge and Huntsville will play only single home and home series. Sabres will have to make only one trip each to Bracebridge and Huntsville and those two teams will come to Acton only once.

Both Sabre games in the north will be on Sunday afternoons. Sabres will also play the other two northern division teams Penetang and Stayner four times and each of their divisional opponents, Bradford, Alliston and Schomberg six times for a total of 30 games. League opener for the Sabres will be on the road Sunday, October 27.

Wingers Gary Turkoz and Pete Morrison who have been with the team all four years it has been in existence and rank 1-2 in all-time Sabre scoring have signed along with returnees Brian Beaumont, the team's most valuable player last year, Charlie McRae and Bob Inglis and newcomer Dave Chapman from Rockwood. in the Metro Toronto Hockey League. Coach Dave McKnight has pared his training camp roster down to 37 from the more than 60 who attended early workouts. Sabres will practice in Georgetown again next week, then hope for early ice here in Acton to prepare for their league opener.

Major concern of coach McKnight now is a goaltender to replace Rick Tomkinson who has signed with the Junior "B" Milton Flyers. Acton midgets Robin Incoe and Ray Dunbar and Georgetown midgets Al Densmore and Ron Osborne are among the prospects trying out for the position.
