For the past few weeks, I've been poring over my cookbooks to find recipes that can be made ahead and left in the oven or in the electric dutch even. With that handy little preset timing bit on the stove, I can arrive home from work knowing that a fair bit of supports all ready. Something simple the family likes is

PLANKED STEAK

2 pounds hamburg 's cup evaporated milk 2 tap. sait

14 tap. pepper Mix ingredients together. Form into a large flat loaf about one inch thick in a shallow baking dish (on a rack that is mostly metal with few holes, if you have one.)

Score the top in a diamond pattern and bake at 425 degrees for 40 minutes. Serves 5

The next recipe is for a little funcier meations. With the oxtra richness, we can stretch it to two meals plus a third left for lunches.

SPECIAL MEAT LOAF 3 pounds ground heef 2 beaten eggs

3 cups soft broad crumbs 1 (715 oz. can) tomato sauco 1 (51/2 oz.) can tomato paste t cup water 1 then sult

14 tsp. each popper, thyme, curry powder . Ve tsp. garlic powder I thep, dried onion flakes

Mix all ingredients well. Shape into loaf in the centre of a 9 by 13 pan (I dislike using loaf pans, as the fat can't drain away). Bake at 325 degrees for 11/4 hours.

By having your own beef butchered and put in the free-· zer, I end up groaning over cuts of meat I would never go out and buy, wondering what to do with the things.

My least favourite is beef short ribs, and after many years I've finally found a recipe I'll stick with.

SHORT RIB DINNER 7 beef short ribs (about 5 nounds)

2 medium onlons, sliced 2 tup. salt & tap, pepper

tsp. sugar tap. WHOLE allapice 4 hay leaves

2 beef bouillon cubes 2 cups hot water Brown ribs well in large

dutch oven, add onlong and stir till brown. Add rest of ingredients and almmer, covered for 2 hours. Remove meat for a minute and fish out allspice and buy leaves.

Thicken stock with 14 cup flour blended with by cup water, and I tap, sugar. (You might need more flour). Return meat to gravy. Add 215 cups cooked pean,

beat well and serve over noodles. Feeds 6 or 8 people.

The next two recipes are for Hallowe'en. It's probably canier to buy bags of junk to hand out to the kids, but if you're feeling industrious, try these.

EASY POPCORN BALLS I small pkg. jello powder 4 cup white sugar 15 cup corn syrup

Mix and bring to boil attr ring constantly over medium heat. Pour over 4 quarts popped popcorn, mix and let sit for one minute. Butter your hands and form the mixture into balts. (Kids are great at doing this.)

Incidentally the cherry flavour powder is nice to start off with, if you're not too sure
