Limehouse parents view new facilities

Parents of Limehouse public school students had an opportunity to view the school's new facilities when they were invited to attend the annual program night.
A tour through the kindergarten, gymnasium, library, staff and nurse's room was the opportunity provided during the first half-hour of the program which ran from 7:30 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. Parents had the chance to examine new physical education, audio visual, teaching aids and p.a. equipment as well as displays of pupil work in physical education, clothing, and gym equipment.
A general assembly gave parents an understanding of the school's objectives for 1974-75 with principal and teacher comments outlining new directions for this year. Later the parents visited classrooms of their particular children where they were brought up-to-date on what lines of study the students would follow for the coming year.

Filling gap
The new gymnasium-auditorium, as well as supplying the obvious need for the Limehouse students, is also filling a gap in the community and already after-school programs are being incorporated into the new facility. Organizations of Brownies, Scouts, Cubs and Guides, utilize the gym from Mondays to Thursday evenings.
One hope of district residents is that the new library will also be used as a community library.
According to Sharon Mosher, school librarian, at the present time nothing concrete has been established, but if the community library does become a reality, it will be through the public library system which will also provide staff during community library hours. The Halton Board of Education will be responsible for public school library books and staff only.
Previously, books at the Limehouse school were housed on shelves located in school hallways. Parents at the program night saw the new facilities as a breakthrough.
Some said they hope to see the gym-auditorium also offered to district adults for evening recreation programs as well as for youth organizations.

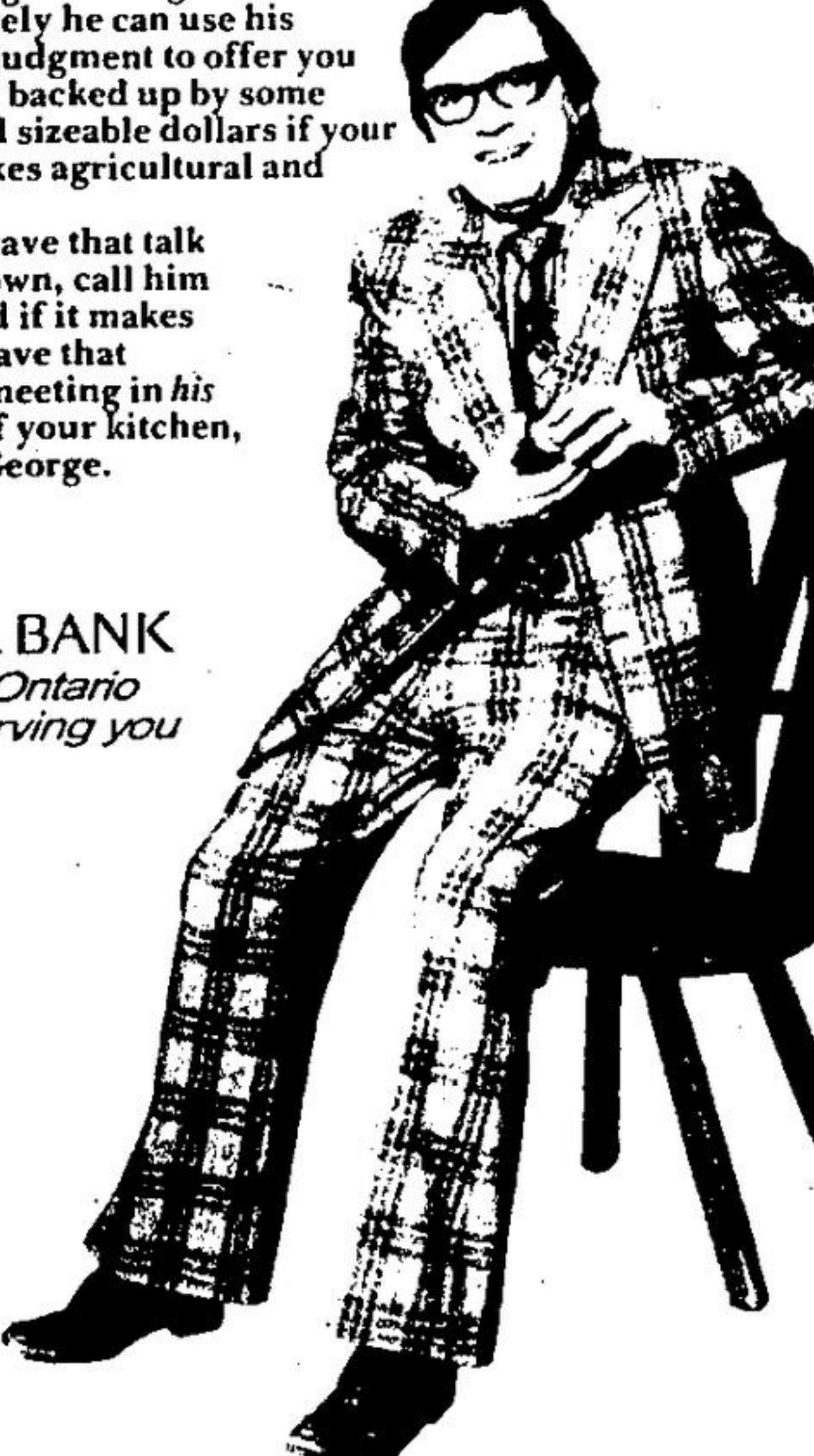
