Junior "C" loop asks new penalty

The Mid-Ontario Junior "C" Hockey League has voted to recommend to the OHA that the penalty for high sticking be increased from two minutes to five minutes. Representatives from Acton, Alliston, Bradford, Schomberg, Stayner, Penetang, Bracebridge and Huntsville have made their proposal to be handed over to the OHA executive at a meeting in Toronto next week.

The meeting was arranged after member teams voted overwhelmingly to throw out the "fight and you're out of the game" rule suggested by Toronto lawyer Bill McMurry in his report on violence in hockey. Each OHA group was given three weeks to come up with alternative suggestions.

The Mid-Ontario group will also stick with a rule it enforced last season. Any player who becomes involved in two major fights in the same game will be tossed out for the remainder of that game and given a further two game suspension.
