Search begins for next Dairy Princess

The search for candidates is on and the sponsoring Halton Milk Committee announced this week the deadline for entering the contest is Friday, Nov. 1. Secretary Vic Lawrence (645-5056 Oakville) or Co-Ordinator Hazel Reid (877-8429 Georgetown) are accepting entries, as is the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food Office in Milton.

Joe Brent, OMAF Dairy Fieldman for this region, said entrants should be between 17 and 26 years (as of opening day of the 1975 Canadian National Exhibition) and must live on a farm where a dairy herd is maintained, in order to be eligible for the CNE competition next year where the Ontario Dairy Princess will be crowned.

After Nov. 1 the sponsoring committee will make arrangements for a competition. The contest includes an interview by a panel of judges, and a brief talk. There is not necessarily a milking competition this year.

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Norval waits after meeting

Residents of Norval must now play the waiting game after what was called a splendid meeting with Premier William Davis last Friday.

The ratepayers, who are fighting to get their school reopened, took their plea right to the top on Friday and Davis said he would take the matter under consideration over the weekend and inform them of his decision early this week. They are to receive word from Davis through Halton East M.P.P. and Minister of Governmental Services Jim Snow early this week. As of press time no word had been received.

"The Premier gave us ample time and showed strong interest," said Norval committee chairman Hugh McFarlane.

He said they asked Davis

for his help in getting the school re-opened. They reviewed their entire fight against the school board and their discussions of earlier this year with Education Minister Tom Wells.

"We didn't suggest ways he could help us but asked him if he knew of any way he could help us," McFarlane reported.

He said Davis pointed out to them the great difficulty in interfering with the decisions of an elected body like the school board.

McFarlane noted Snow made a very strong plea to the Premier on behalf of the Norval residents.

"Davis, Snow and Wells all expressed concern and sympathy with our problem. It was really something considering we are only 200 of

seven million people they are concerned with," McFarlane said.

He said they had indicated strongly to the Premier that they were simply unwilling to accept the board's decision.

McFarlane did suggest the government set up an appeal board for school board rulings but Davis didn't think it would work well. "He pointed out to us that if there was an appeal body they would be facing every decision school boards made in the province that a few people didn't like. It would be a catch all proposition and would not work out too well. He added that Snow didn't think a judicial type body would work."

"Now we can only wait to hear more specifically what Davis thinks can be done. We certainly realize that their hands are tied in lots of ways," McFarlane said.

Moffat, who were married in Barrie Hill on Saturday. They will be living in Guelph.

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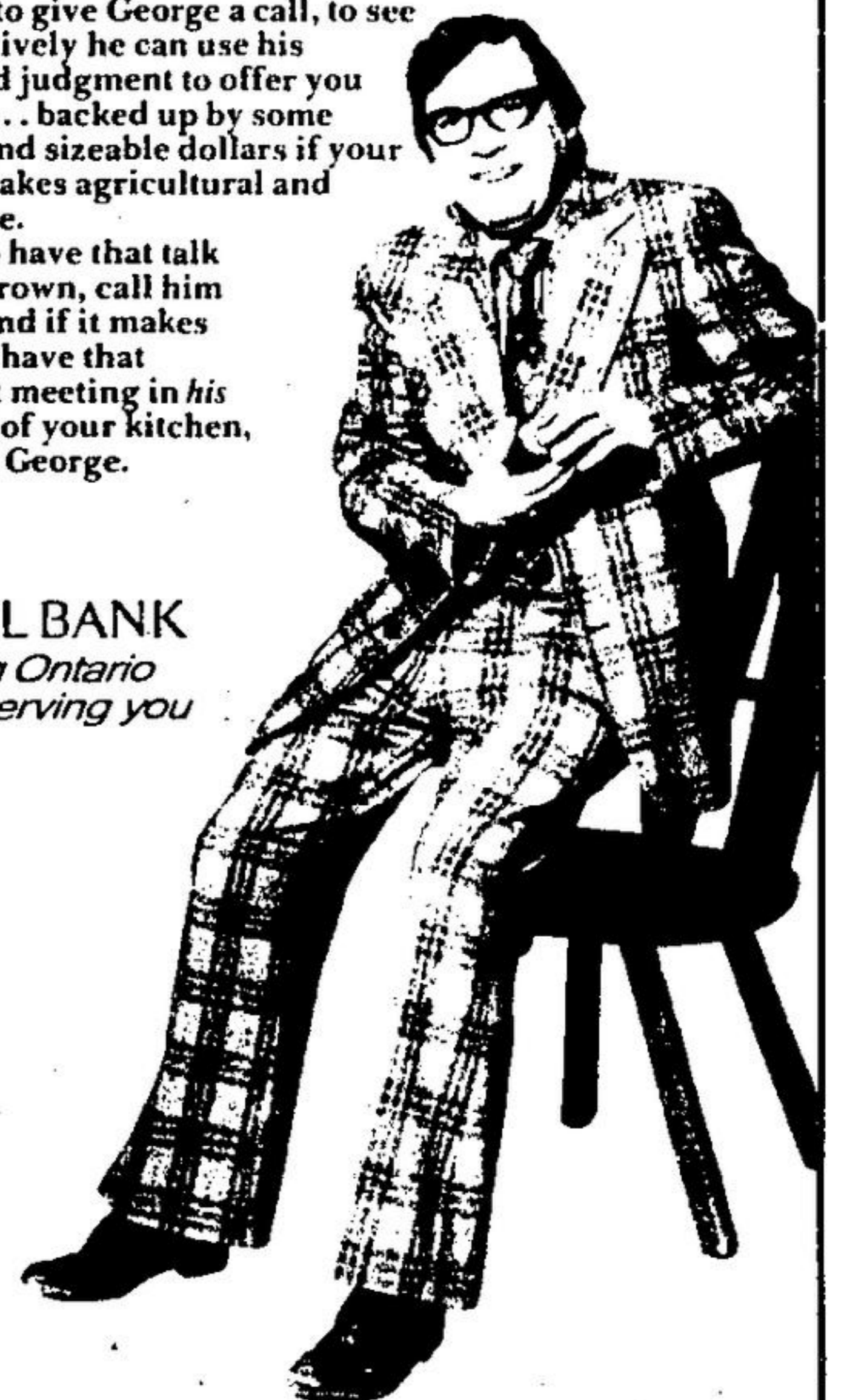
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
