

FOUR DIED in a three-car collision Friday evening on Halton Rd. No. 1 just north of 25 Sideroad. It was two and a half hours after the rending collision that Roy's Auto Collision was able to attach chains to the crumpled cars and tow them away to Campbellville. Two Guelph

residents and a Burlington couple died in two cars and one passenger escaped. A third car was involved but the passengers were uninjured. Acton firefighters and North Halton O.P.P. were joined in the darkness by doctors, ambulances and the Milton emergency van.



Delay quarry zoning ruling

The Niagara Escarpment Commission will be asked to voice its opinion on whether or not a 600 acre parcel of land at Speyside owned by Consolidated Sand and Gravel should be zoned ex-

tractive industrial. An Ontario Municipal Board hearing was adjourned Monday when legal counsel objecting to plans to quarry the land near St. Helena Rd. suggested the meeting would be futile until the Escarpment Commission had determined be controlled by the com-

mission. Grace Maitland-Carter, a solicitor representing the Commission said the policy control area had been presented to the Ministry of Housing and was awaiting the approval and subsequent publishing of the developcontrol policies and bounCan apply

She pointed out the 600 acre parcel fell within the proposed boundaries and added the policy of the commission was not to grant permission for any new quarties or gravel pits until the regulations were published. She noted there would be an opportunity for the firm and for others to apply and ask to be removed from the
