

Cecil Patterson is acclaimed top 4-H member in Halton

Halton 4-H Agricultural Club members wound up another successful and event-filled year Saturday, Oct. 26, with the annual awards night at Ernest C. Drury School auditorium in Milton. It took two full hours to hand out all the awards and prizes the 142 members earned in completing 189 projects this year.

Cecil Patterson was selected winner of the J. E. Whitelock Trophy as the most outstanding 4-H member in Halton. The Claude Bain trophy for the outstanding first year member went to Ellen Hurren, and the Halton-Peel Pork Producers Trophy for the outstanding member with 11 or less projects completed was won by Bill Allison.

Best secretary
4-H Secretary of the Year award went to Barb Brown and the Premier 4-H Club of 1974 was the 4-H Horse Club. Kivans Club of the Kingsway scholarships were awarded to the top member in each club including: Marie Murray, Bruce McKeown, James Lindsay, Holly Hurren, Dianne Dorsey, Joseph Weeden, John Reid and Bill Robinson.

Special Project competition winners were: photo collection, Nancy McKinnon; scrap book, Joseph Weeden; 4-H sign, Roy Fish; knots and splices, Heidi Stadler; feeds, weeds or woods, Doug McPhail; show box, Diana Royce; miscellaneous, Cindy Brown.

Reporting on the past year, agricultural representative Henry J. Stanley said the new Veterinary Science Club was well received by the Snowmobile Club had to be cancelled, partly because of a lack of snow. Lamb classes
At Rockton Fair in the 4-H Inter-club Lamb Classes, Leslie Knight had the Champion Lamb with Joseph Weeden placing sixth.

Halton 4-H members again placed well in the C.N.E. judging competition. Ken McNabb won over 75 other contestants in the senior section with Bill Allison placing seventh, James Lindsay 12th and Keith McKinnon 30th out of 224 in the juniors. We were also quite pleased in the interest in our Livestock and Seed Judging competitions and in the Guelph Evaluation Day.

Here are the leaders' reports on the three "outstanding" members of 1974:
First year
Ellen Hurren was a member of the Halton 4-H Holstein Club, placing sixth out of 36 members with a score of 895. She had a high score in the club for reports and very good farm visit and quiz scores. Her 4-H sign placed fourth in the special projects.

She was fifth with her Junior Calf at Achievement Day and was in the second prize group for showmanship. In the special showmanship class for first year members, she placed second. In the livestock judging competition, Ellen was 10th Junior.

(Outstanding runner-ups were Kim Wingrove and Carol Ann Laidlaw.)

Eight projects
Bill Allison has completed eight 4-H projects in the last five years. He has excelled this year in his 4-H projects and in judging. He was top member in the Halton 4-H Beef Calf Club, fourth in the livestock judging club and fifth in the 4-H Tractor Club. His steer was second and Bill placed second in showmanship.

In the County Livestock judging competition, he was the high scoring member winning the champion livestock judging trophy as well as the champion dairy judging trophy.

Top in Halton
Cecil Patterson has had a very active 4-H career, completing 189 projects in the past six years. This year he completed six projects—Veterinary Science, Livestock Judging, Dairy, Grain, Forage and Tractor. His top placing was a first in the

Halton 4-H Field Crop Club. His leadership abilities showed forth this year as President of the 4-H Field Crop, Livestock Judging and Tractor Clubs. He was also mainly responsible for the demonstrations put on by many of his clubs, and was one of the delegates to the Provincial 4-H Conference at Guelph.

Cecil had a great year in the judging competitions—first at Guelph Evaluation Day; high Senior in Seed Judging, winning the Small Seeds Trophy and the Royal Bank Trophy; third Senior in the County Livestock Judging, winning the Champion Swine Judging Trophy; and top combined score for seed and livestock judging, winning the Norval Junior Farmer Trophy.

At 49 years of age, Em Lavender has been promoted to the highest post in the education in Halton Region. The Halton Board of Education announced Lavender's appointment as Director of Education at a meeting in Milton Thursday night.

Lavender will replace Jim Singleton who resigned last week but will stay on until June 30. Informed sources indicate that Lavender was considering a directorship with another board. Individuals qualified to step into the job are said to be few and far between.

Several trustees expressed a desire to have the position advertised on the open market but when it came to the vote all but trustee Dick Godwin supported the appointment.

In a prepared statement Director Jim Singleton said, "Em is a person steeped in the tradition of the Halton system and highly cognizant of those qualities of students, professional staff, principals, consulting staff, supervisors, officers and board which have made Halton a 'light-house' educational operation in this province. He has participated in almost all of those endeavors which have caused other systems to look to Halton for leadership. Industrial permits
Industrial permits were the big items in the October building reports accounting for \$250,000 of the \$669,119 total.

A \$200,000 industrial office and factory is being built by Labelmasters Ltd. at 120 Armstrong Avenue, Georgetown, just along the road from their present plant.

A scale house and equipment storage building for the Region of Halton is going up on Armstrong Avenue at a cost of \$30,000.

A new Twin Woodworking industrial office and showroom is nearing completion on Mountainview Road North at a cost of \$20,000. The plant in Limehouse will also continue to operate.

A boat storage shed, costing \$11,000 is being added to the Credit River Boat Co. in Norval and a \$6,000 equipment storage building is being built by D. Barclay in Stewarttown.

On the Fourth Line near Acton, York Auto Wrecker is building a warehouse valued at \$9,000.

Permits for houses dropped to 11 this month, for a total value of \$335,000. So far this

year 314 house permits have been issued, with the majority in the Acton area. Despite the approaching winter three swimming pool permits were issued last month, bringing the total for the year to 151.

The municipality collected \$1,606 in building permit fees last month, and total of \$31,602 for the year to date.

On Halloween night, an eight-year-old girl was indecently assaulted at her Church St. residence. A man walked into the house at 11:45 p.m. and he fled in a station wagon when she screamed. The matter is still under investigation.

There were two liquor seizures and a man was charged with petty trespass.

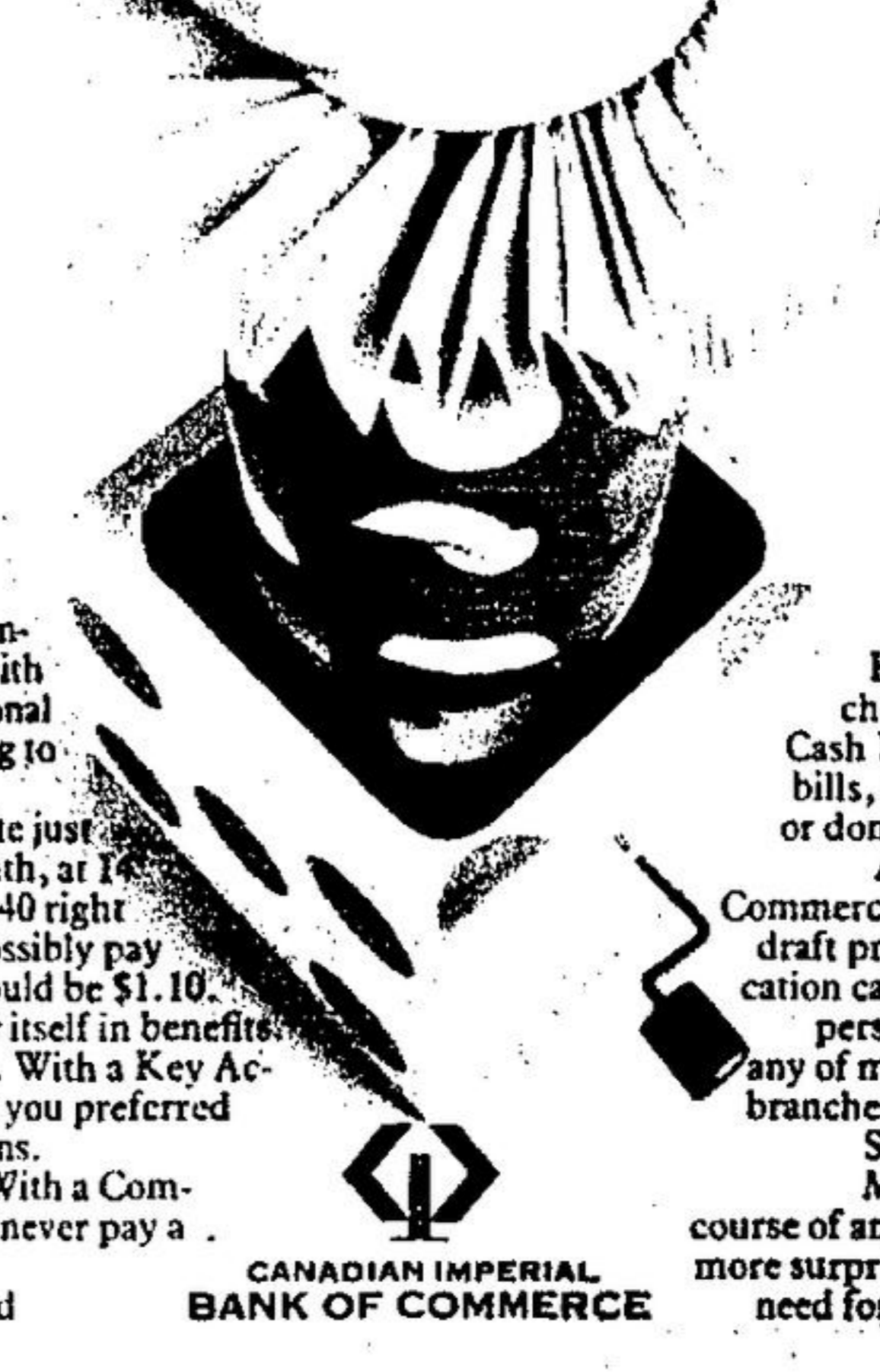
Guest at Knox
