

Eramosa township council briefs

Monday's meeting of the Eramosa township council was a lengthy one which did not adjourn until 12:15 a.m. All members were in attendance with reeve Warren Parkinson presiding.

The following motions were passed:
 THAT the building inspector notify Elmer Millson that the side-yard requirements of township must be adhered to;

THAT a grant of \$75 be made to the Acton Agricultural Society;

THAT it be resolved that the township of Eramosa council is not in favor of the

establishment of a county library as described in section 46 of the Public Library Act;

THAT E. H. Uderstadt, engineer approach the owner of the pond causing drainage problems to the boundary road between the township of Eramosa and town of Milton and endeavor to alleviate the problem;

THAT the Eramosa Township Council express their appreciation to the Medical Wellington Co-operative for their donation of \$15,000 to aid in construction of the Rockwood Medical

Centre which will be available with offices for two doctors or one doctor and a dentist, applicable for expansion;

THAT the clerk and assistant attend the clerk-treasurer's meeting in Atwood on Nov. 15 with registration fees and expenses paid by the township;

THAT the clerk-treasurer submit application to the Ministry of Housing for the home renewal program. The motion read, "The council of the corporation of the township of Eramosa hereby authorize the clerk-treasurer to submit application to the Ministry of Housing for the home renewal program and be it further resolved the said corporation agrees to draft a standard building by-law to comply with the requirements of the Ministry of Housing;

THAT the treasurer add to accounts to be paid Nov. 4, the expenses incurred for meals by council on trip to Toronto to the deputy-minister of environment, registration re clerk-treasurer's meeting at Wellington plus other sundry cash expenses totalling \$39.39;

THAT the clerk notify the Liquor Licence Board as follows: (1) That a dining lounge licence be interpreted as a liquor with meals only, in accordance with plebiscite taken in 1972; (2) That the parking facilities are totally inadequate for number of patrons suggested (372);

THAT the clerk and E. H. Uderstadt investigate the legality of the petition for drainage (Greenspan drainage works) for the drainage referee;

THAT the council authorize a rebate of \$14.47 to Edward Kingsbury for a building demolished under sec. 636a of the Municipal Act;

THAT the proposal of the Eramosa recreation committee to purchase land for recreational facilities be referred to the 1975 council;

THAT a request be made to the Ministry of Transportation and Communication for a supplementary allocation of monies for work on road and bridges in amount of \$1,000 for a pipe arch culvert on Water St., Rockwood;

THAT council is agreeable to pay cost difference between a party and private line for road superintendent;

THAT accounts amounting to \$59,551.44 (general accounts - \$11,077.14 road accounts - \$42,474.30), be passed for payment. The meeting was adjourned to meet Monday, Dec. 16 at 7:30 p.m. or at call of reeve.

This Sunday marks Remembrance Day

Remembrance day services will be held Sunday, Nov. 10 for Rockwood community. As usual, members of the Acton Legion and Rockwood village organizations will parade to the cenotaph where the annual "placing of wreaths" ceremony will be conducted for departed veterans of the community at 11 a.m.

Following the service, the parade will march to Rockwood Centennial school where an interdenominational service will be held with representa-

tives at all village churches participating. Speaker of the morning will be Rev. H.G. Rees, present minister of the Rockwood United Church. Some church services will be cancelled as they run conjunctively with the 11 a.m. memorial service. These include those of the Presbyterian and United Church.

Legion representative Jim Milne says that poppies will be distributed to all district children at the schools with others placed for purchase in various community stores. On Thursday evening, Nov. 7, Rover Scouts will be taking poppies to the village residents. "All collections including loose collection at the Sunday service after expenses, will be turned over to the poppy fund for disabled veterans," he said.

Hallowe'en quiet on local front

Hallowe'en fell true to form last Thursday evening when the Oct. 31 trick and treating was carried out in the typical atmosphere of sultry dampness, making visibility difficult and parents anxious their small charges make their rounds safely.

From early evening to later hours, costumed forms could be seen flitting from house to house. As evening waned, they gradually disappeared, complete with weighted bags of holiday treats. By midnight everything was quiet on the Rockwood front.

Brigade called During the evening, the fire siren was heard twice. The brigade was called to Eden Mills sometime near the hour of 9 p.m. Franksters had set a bale of hay on fire on the bridge. Another call for the Rockwood-Eramosa brigade took them just above the tracks in Rockwood where they doused a gasoline fire which had been ignited. An oil slick on Highway 7 also required attention when approximately ten gallons of used oil was taken from Petty's garage and poured on the highway in front, as it rounds the curve. The firefighters washed down the dangerous slick, topping it with a load of sand.

The Guelph OPP made frequent visits to the village but reported later that the evening was relatively quiet with only the usual Hallowe'en pranks occurring. On Thursday, Oct. 30, vandals threw rocks through two windows at Centennial school causing an estimated damage of \$320.

Area resident tragically killed

An accident which occurred about 7:30 a.m. Sunday morning, claimed the life of a well-known Eramosa resident.

Gordon R. Somerville, R.R. 5, Rockwood was on his way to work at Hart Chemicals on Victoria Rd., Guelph when the car he was driving was struck by a passenger train at the intersection of Victoria Rd. and Elizabeth St.

The car was shoved 400 feet along the railroad track and rolled down a 150-foot embankment before coming to a halt. Dr. Frank Farmer, Wellington county coroner, pronounced him dead at the scene.
