# A beehive of industry at ARC

The old schoolhouse at Hornby, with the sign A.R.C. Industries, is a common sight to many commuters on their way to work. Not too many know however, the industry that goes on in that peaceful rural building.

The Adult Rehabilitation Centre, with 22 retarded trainees, turns out work there for various companies every day of the week.

Last week's Open House was an eye-opener for many visitors, when they saw snow skates being packed for Mississauga Tel-Pro, educational toys being assembled for Irwin Toy Ltd., and drum caps put together for Rieke of Brampton.

Baltimore Aireoil of Georgetown has a contract with the centre, where the 22 trainees make ceramic products of all kinds, firing and glazing them in their own kiln.

A standby at the Centre since it opened eight years ago has been the rewebbing of lawn chairs.

The impetus for the outside contract was given the Centre with the expansion three years ago which added a large area at the back and a full basement.

About half of the 22 trainees are graduates of Sunshine School for the Retarded.

A residence for the adult retarded will be built not far from the workshop, on the Seventh Line, near Hornby. After a few fruitless years of trying to find land the land was purchased last year for the private residence for the retarded. Work on the building is expected to start this winter.

The Adult Rehabilitation Centre is a sheltered workshop where mentally retarded are given the opportunity to develop their abilities and go to acquire self-respect, leading a useful life.

In this atmosphere the handicapped can be integrated into the community, and some after training can find employment outside the sheltered workshop.

A.H.C. Industries, is a non-profit organization, operated by the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded.
