At a public meeting just after the decision had been made, all available chairs and some chesterfields were in use and people were still left standing. Last Wednesday during a regular session of council about 30 Milton District High School students made the trip south to see the "circus" and they were left to scatter themselves about the floor. Mannell re-introduced the matter of more chairs and finally, authorization was given. The expenditure, estimated at \$200, will be absorbed in the region's \$15,000,000 budget.

## 1915 Buick car

This is the only 1915 McLaughlin Bulck louring car of its kind left in the world. It is on loan to the museum courtesy of Russ Cole of Hornby. He bought it from Bob Peel of Galt in 1962 when it was little more than a rusted out shell. It had 10,000 miles on it at that time. Since then Mr. Cole has put some 3,000 miles on the car and describes it as "a very dependable car." It took five years to completely restore it and it was first put back on the road in 1967.

1915 was the first year an electric starter was standard equipment on cars. When new the price was \$1,250. Weight of the car is 2,150 pounds.

It has a three speed transmission with reverse, and the tires are 34 by 41/2 inches with 25 inch rims. It has a four cylinder roller cam cast engine with top speed of 65 mph, although it is difficult to steer at that speed. It gets approximately nine miles to the gallon.

This car has most recently been used by the CBC as the family car in the Jaina family White Oaks ser-

Committee at work


A building and site committee has been involved in finding a permanent location for almost a year now. Some consideration is being given to sharing accommodation with Halton Board of Education and other local government bodies.
