Out of 97 contestants David was second high in judging in the Inter-County Livestock Evaluation competitions. David in company with Rob Burns of Belwood and Arnold Small of Conn was a delegate from Wellington County on the Junior Farmer Livestock Management tour from Nov. 10 to 15.

This team of three young men brought back for the county, the Ontario Veterinary Association Challenge Trophy for swine judging at the Royal Agriculture Winter Fair. They received 419 points out of a possible 450.
