No house for farm help

Halton Hills council refused to issue a building permit to Mrs. Linda P. Pabst, for a tenant house for farm help on her 100 acre farm at Lot 31, Con. 9., but added a rider saying if proof of a bona fide farm operation was submitted they would reconsider.

Councillor Len Cox pointed out Esquencing council had passed a bylaw stating only one building permit per lot was allotted in the former township, except in the case of a bona fide farmer, where the house would be used for farm help.

Councillor Pat McKenzie said the farm help was needed to make the farm productive.

Cox emphasized council had to stay with the policy. He warned they could find themselves in an untenable position by making arbitrary decisions.

One building inspector's report stated a two bedroom bungalow was planned to try to attract a couple to work the land and diversify the farm. He said the house would conform to all existing building requirements.

Councillor He Morrow said he considered this property estate farming of the highest quality, and said, "even the tenant house will be pretty fancy." He said the increased assessment would be a benefit to the town.

Councillor Roy Booth said he found it difficult to believe any farming surrounding "a mansion like this" would be a farm operation as commonly known.

"I want to be sure we're not issuing a permit for a gardener and a maid," commented Councillor Dick Howitt.

Morrow claimed council have to decide what is best for the municipality. He pointed out if the Pabsts wanted a separation they were legally entitled to it. "It would be the pride and joy of any municipality to have a place like this," added Morrow. He

asked if council intended to cripple the municipality by stopping large estates, if the owners wanted a separate house for gardeners, maids or any other help.

"We don't want to flaunt the by-law just because someone is rich, either," commented Booth.

Councillor Ernie Sykes pointed out they need the help to make the land produce. "Which comes first the house or the help?" he mused.

Councillor Russell Miller claimed the applicants had started to farm by cutting hay from the 100 acres.

"I haven't been in this mansion," began Councillor Joe Hurst, "but rather than set a precedent, I think they should do more to prove they

are bona fide farmers before issuing a permit.

The majority of council agreed by voting against the issuance of a building permit.
