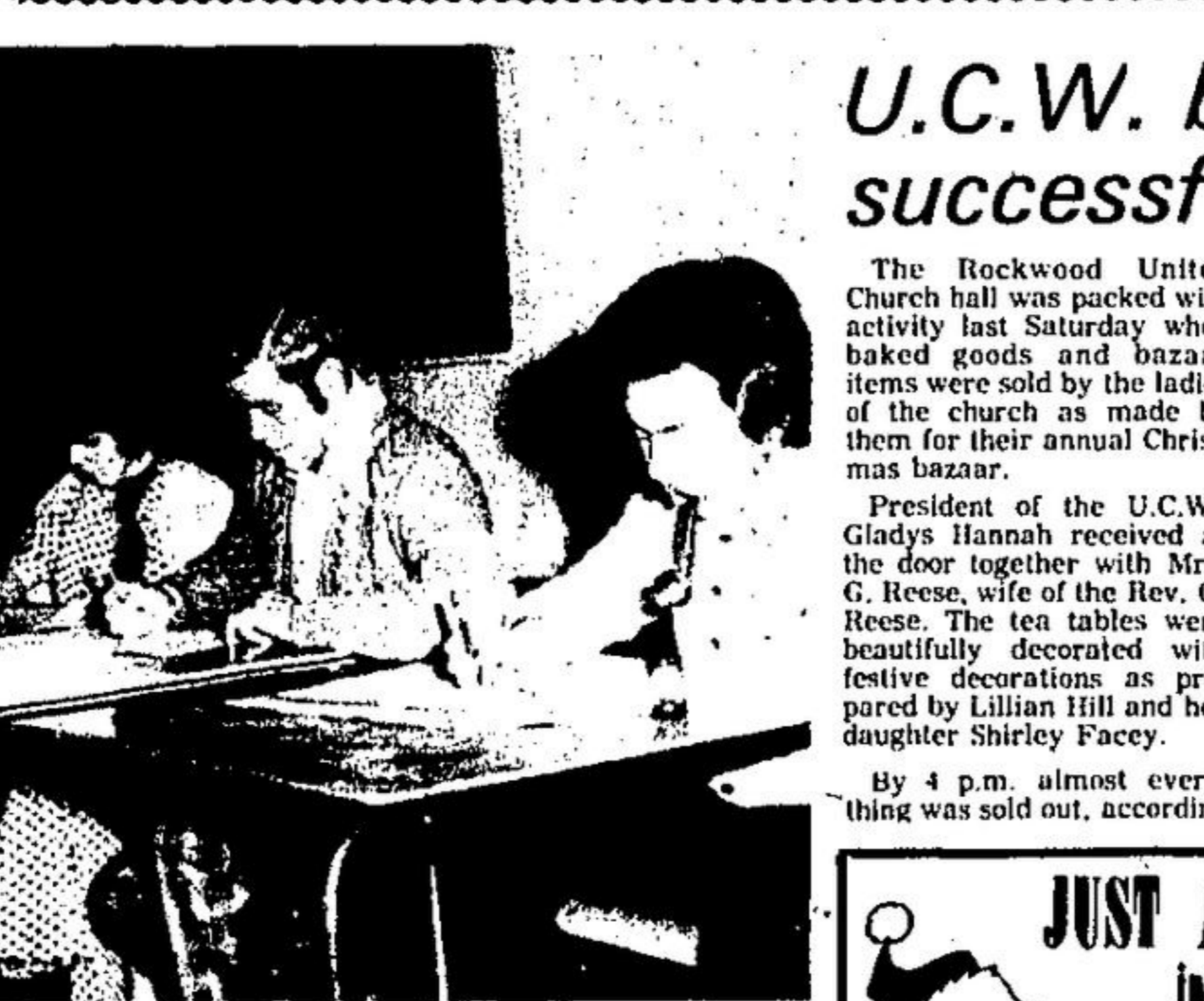
Smallest polling station decides Eramosa council

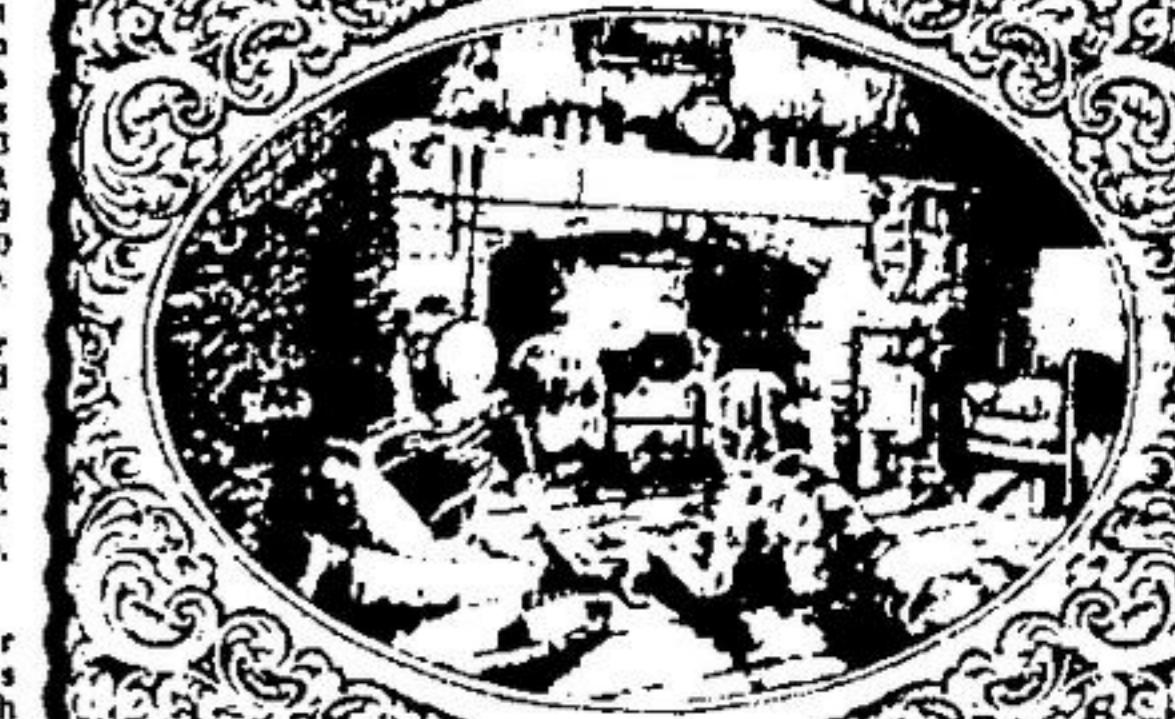
Guelphites were victors over Optimists with a 3 to 2 score. Ross Gordon lined in a 669 triple with singles 273, 233 and 163. Lloyd
