### Chinese brush exhibit grand success at Academy

Saturday's project was a sell-out when over 275 people congregated at the Rockwood Academy to view an exhibit of Chinese brush painting as executed by Dr. Anthony Kingscote, sponsored by the St. John's Church on the occasion of the 100th Anniversary of the Niagara Diocese of the Anglican Church in Canada.

The art exhibit was planned as an excellent way for the local church to get their part of the celebration off the ground and all proceeds are slated for the Canadian North mission fund.

Northern Missions Although the northern Canada Anglican Church missions are subsidized regularly through gifts and commitments, Bishop John Bothwell made a special appeal for support this year. In a personal message to the diocese, Bishop Bothwell said, "When there is a crisis in a family, prompt action is necessary." He pointed out there is a crisis in funds for Anglican work in the north and overseas and that regular gifts must continue and increase. "In recent years special circumstances have created special human needs which we cannot ignore." The bishop pointed out "It is in-

teresting that this appeal comes to us in the same month as our 100th annual Diocesan Synod. The target date for \$340,000 of the overall appeal, is Nov. 17, for the years 1974 and 1975."

Many of the Canadian missions are located in northern Ontario and Arctic regions, with others, in Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. Parishes are usually scattered over large areas, depending on the diocese. Ministers are often forced to travel considerable distances to serve churches where only a small number of people constitute the congregations composed of Eskimos, Indians and English Canadians. A great many of these parishes are very poor, consequently ministers' salaries are frequently too meagre for them and their families to

live on comfortably. Although

usually there are three or four churches under the care of one minister, sometimes there are as many as seven and eight.

Drawing cards The missions, the academy and the exhibit of paintings were all drawing cards which helped towards the success of Saturday's evening. Even the weather co-operated as guests attended from Hamilton, Guelph, Toronto and local communities.

Josef Drenters, owner of the academy, said later that he was impressed at the general friendliness and goodwill generated at the exhibit. Visitors feit the occasion was more like a large party than a formal affair. Time for visiting had been set between the hours of B to 11 p.m., but many guests stayed on through the entire three hours, chatting with friends and new acquaintances.

#### Sytske Drijber plans Good News Club in '75

Twenty-seven subjects were packed into a three months learning session for one Rockwood mother who recently graduated as a qualified teacher from the school of Child Evangelism Fellowship near Muskegon,

Sytake Drijber returned from her specialized training course two weeks ago. She describes her stay at the school as challenging but fun. "I really can again understand the high-schooler's complaint about being under pressure," she says, and talls how, inspite of the strain of constant learning and exams, the common struggle to com-plete the course welded the students into a real fellow-

Students from all over U.S.A. and Canada attended the course, according to Mrs. Drijber. She says that similar courses are being conducted in Africa, the Middle East, Europe and Australia with missionaries attending from all continents. She describes the assignments as being of a practical nature so that they may be used by the graduates in their work at home.

Home missionaries "We are considered homemissionaries after graduation," says Mrs. Drijber. She feels there is much scope right in our vicinities for Christian learning. The tea-cher explains that, according to statistics of the National Sunday School Association, two-thirds of the child population of any given area do not go to church on Sunday. Mrs. Drijber feels on that basis, there are approximately 200 children in the Rockwood area who do not attend

church and would be con-

sidered "unreached young-Mrs. Drijber tells how students were a mixed group of all ages and many vocations.
"There were ministers who'd given up their pulpits for this type of endeavour, public school toachers who felt there was more to teaching than the three R's, young people who'd just spent the past summer doing C.E.F. summer work and others, people like me, who just wanted to know

The mother feels the exams were strenuous and kept everyone on their toes but that all who attended benefited from the teaching and indepth fellowship derived. She recommends the course to anyone genuinely interested in Christian evangelism.

According to Mrs. Drijber, the C.E.F.'s aim is to reach the unreached children with the gospel, with a goal of making the ministry self-supporting in every area of the world. It operates as a service organization and through its teacher-training program, directors at home and abroad train volunteer teachers of established Sunday Schools if requested by church superin-

The teacher hopes to bring a Good News Club into the community in the new year. She says that already many children have asked when she is going to begin.
