



Two district men start unique new business

Ingenuity is the backbone of a newly-started business where two local men are putting talents to work in building a unique enterprise.

Harry McFadden of R. R. 1, Campbellville and Henry Zimniewich of Everton have more than one important thing in common. Besides being married to two sisters, they are both graduates of a community college course as maintenance mechanics, and like to apply their abilities to creative things.

Harry is a former soldier who served six years with the United Nations Peace Corps, stationed at Cyprus. He came back to Canada in 1968 and enrolled in the specialized trade course. His brother-in-law, Henry, was employed with a company in Guelph. He took the same course at Conestoga and, after graduation, both worked with Spancrete of Ontario, making hollow-core slabs for construction.

Smaller jobs While working in the building trade the two men could see a need of casual labor supply, where people requiring "around-the-house" jobs could call on qualified assistance from some company or agency. According to Harry, they felt there are many side-jobs which big contractors won't touch and often it is difficult for a householder to locate someone who can handle smaller jobs efficiently.

On this premise the two men decided to set up a business where they could apply their own special skills. Both had worked at installing electrical and plumbing supplies, they had been trained in welding, wood-working and most types of machinery maintenance and operation.

About June 1 of this year, Harry and Henry made their decision. They formed a new company called Renovations Unlimited and advertised themselves as doing any kind of job requiring expert assistance. Jobs in the area mushroomed and gradually the small business required helpers. Everything from roofing to building additions came into their field of operation and, according to Henry, nothing was too big or too little for the corporation to handle.

Nothing is too difficult for the industrious pair who say, "We want to supply authentic accessories required for old homes." For this reason they are looking for people restoring older homes who want reproductions but don't know where to find them. "We feel we can make accessories which will match the period of the house at reasonable cost," says Henry. He referred to many custom pieces he and his brother-in-law have already completed to match old houses in the district.

Location At the moment, location and name of the shop in which they will sell their items has not been decided. Both men feel that, once things go into operation, they will make items for various shops to sell on consignment. "We'll have one central headquarters for taking orders for people who want items made up," said Henry. Several pieces are ready for sale at their present headquarters. Sign posts, weathervanes and custom lamp posts will be some of the other things we'll be making," Henry added. The men feel this new project will fit in easily with their

business. "It's a sideline right now," the both agree. "If it really goes over well, that's what we could eventually slide into permanently," said Harry.

Henry also enjoys working with old cars. An antique car buff, he is the owner of a model A coach and an old '36 Chevy which he keeps in top running condition. He is a member of the Motivators Car Club in Guelph. Both men enjoy applying themselves to restoration and, if their new line is successful it will provide them with the opportunity to work and enjoy what they're doing, a scope which too often escapes the reach of most people.
