Two district men start unique new business

Ingenuity is the backbone of a newly-started business where two local men are putting talents to work in building

a unique enterprise. Harry McFadden of R. R. t, Campbellville and Henry Zimniewich of Everton have more than one important thing in common. Besides being married to two sisters, they are both graduates of a community college course as maintenance mechanics, and like to apply their abilities to creative things.

Harry is a former soldier who served six years with the United Nations Peace Corps, stationed at Cyprus. He came back to Canada in 1968 and enrolled in the specialized trade course. His brother-inlaw, Henry, was employed with a company in Guelph. He took the same course at Conestoga and, after grad-uation, both worked with Spancrete of Ontario, making hollow-core slabs for construction.

tance from some company or agency. According to Harry, they felt there are many sidejobs which blg contractors won't touch and often it is difficult for a householder to locate someone who can handle smaller jobs efficiently.

On this premise the two men decided to set up a business where they could apply their own special skills. Both had worked at installing elec-trical and plumbing supplies, they had been trained in welding, wood-working and most types of machinery maintenance and operation,

About June t of this year, Harry and Henry made their decision. They formed a new company called Renovations Unlimited and advertised themselves as doing any kind of job requiring expert assis-tance. Jobs in the area mushroomed and gradually the small business required helpers. Everything from roofing to building additions came into their field of operation and, according to Henry, nothing was too big or too little for the corporation to handle.

Another facet

During the fall months, another facet of the progressing company sprung up Both men enjoy artistic abili ties. Many times, as a tradehobby, they had constructed pieces of iron and wood-work furnishings which had been quickly grabbed up by friends or buyers interested in procuring unique conversation pieces for their homes.

With winter producing job slack-offs, Henry and Harry investigated production and demand for the specialty items using Iron and wood,

Today, during peiods of "inbetween jobs" the two men can be found in their home workshop producing many imaginative ideas of their own as well as reproducing vintage pieces which have been broken off or lost. Old door hinges, lamp parts and other items requiring replacements, all fall into their new operation. 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
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
