School, Milton; Andy Shoemaker of St. Michael's School, Oakville; and Christopher Crozier of Holy Rosary School, Milton.

The annual contest was open only to students of grade five in Halton and was conducted through the local fire departments in Oakville, Milton and Halton Hills (Acton and Georgetown). Winners from the four local divisions went on to the regional competition and the Guelph Fire Prevention Bureau and Guelph Fire Chief Arnold Quillman

selected the winners. Burlington Firefighters were unable to arrange a local contest in time to participate in the Halton competition this year. But a separate contest is planned early in 1975 through the Burlington Library.

All six winners will be receiving a prize from the Halton Committee early in the new year. Each will receive a desk pen set and certificate. The top two posters drawn by Russell Laffin and Sheila Cannon will go on to an all-Ontario competition.
