What the law says

The law states: "where a school bus is stopped on a highway or part of a highway on which the maximum speed limit is greater than 35 miles per hour for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children, the driver of a vehicle, (a) when overtaking a school bus on which the words "do not pass when signals flashing" are marked and two red signallights are illuminated by intermittent flashes; and (b) when meeting on such a highway, other than a highway with a median strip, a school bus on the front of which two red signal-lights are illuminated with intermittent flashes shall stop the vehicle before reaching the school

pavement of more than ten feet in width, a physical barrier or an unpaved strip of ground.

Requirements

There are several laws which the bus lines also have to follow. The word "school bus" must be painted in black on a yellow background. Red flashing lights must also be installed, and they must stop at every railway crossing.

The newer model buses must have padded poles and seats. The Halton board of education can, by law, insist on three children to a seat up to grade seven. However, they are lenient with this law and leaves it up to the driver. Both the Wellington and the Halton boards of education
