-DO make sure you buy a fresh Christmas tree. Bend the needles-of they bend ensity the tree is fresh; but if they are brittle and break easily, the tree is too dry. Choose another.

One week -DON'T put the tree up in the house or apartment until a week before Christmas. Leave it outside or in a cool place until you are ready to

-DO make a fresh cut on put a tree in a doorway or the butt of the tree, an inch or hallway, blocking an exit. two from the bottom. This

will help your tree soak up approved lighting sets molsture from the water inspect them before use, for -DON'T erect the tree

near firentaces, radiators, TV sets or any other source of -DON'T place any heat or electricity. And never on or near your tree.

-DO use only CSA approved lighting sets. frayed or damaged sockets. Avoid candles

-DON'T place any capilles

-DON'T leave your children alone in the home even for a minute over the holiday
