Bill 151 amendments give region power over sewers, water

According to Halton Regional Solicitor Noel Bates an amendment to Bill 151, a bill implementing regional government in Halton is expected to receive third reading and become effective

Jan. 1, 1975. The main thrust of the amendment would give regional council more power in the area of sewers and

At the current time all sewer projects are carried out by the region but it is the area municipal council that decides how to pay for the

the pending legislation the area council will no longer have that decision to make, it will be a regional one.

Two methods The regional council will have to decide whether or not the project should go ahead and how it should be paid. The work could be rated over the region as a whole or carried out under local improvement. Under that scheme property owners benefitting from the new service share costs with the region.

There is provision in the legislation for chargebacks but that is cumberstone and adds about three months in the approval seeking process, Bates says.

Regional treasurer Don Farmer said that as he understood the amendment, it readly. would mean that someone in Halton Hills or Milton would be paying the same for sewer service based on equalized assessment as someone in Burlington or Oakville. As of 1977 the region is expected to be on market value assessment and at that time the weighted equalized assessment factor can be forgotten. It is anticipated that the region eventually will move towards a common water rate across the region.

While regional councillors have only the benefit of sketchy proposals to date, those questioned were cool to

the proposal. Milton Mayor Anne MacArthur favors staying with the chargeback system. She suggests that under that system each municipality

gets what it pays for.

She claims the step would be bad for the whole of Milton and wondered what sort of compensation would be provided for those in rural areas who have to dig their own wells and septic systems. Two ratings

Treasurer Don Farmer says the region would have to develop an urban service area so that there are different ratings for those living in rural areas and those enjoying urban services.

Oakville Councillor Gordon Brown said he felt the chargeback system was a logical step to follow. He opposed any move to tamper with that system for at least another year.

"It's the only way to keep the region on an even keel. We can't have one paying for the other." He questioned the need for the existing system to take an additional three months and said he felt there was an existing procedure for the application to be handled

Esquesing area councillor Len Coxe said he hadn't learned enough of the proposed amendment to comment but he felt there were many other aspects of the bill that needed amending before the chargeback

Some northern councillors that without a chargeback system, small municipalities will have a difficult time having projects approved.

Some feel that under the proposed system the region will determine which areas will be developed. Local councils will have very little say about which areas should be developed.
