DO make sure you buy a fresh Christmas tree Bend the needles - if they bend easily the tree is fresh; but if they are brittle and break easily, the tree is too dry.

Thoose another DON'T put the tree up in the house or apartment until a week before Christmas. Leave it outside or in a cool · place until you are ready to

licips tree - DO make a fresh cut on the butt of the tree, an inch or two from the bottom. This will help your tree soak up moisture from the water re-





