Pursue bylaw

The finance committee of Halton Hills council decided to pursue the lengthy comprehensive licensing by-law despite predictions by Clerk Dong Pritchard that it would be the biggest by-law they

ever handled. R's 64 pages long, the clerk reported, and presently being perused by licensing officer Grant Usher Councillor McKenzie was
