Priestner raps Renaissance

Halton's retiring Board of Education Chairman William Priestner took advantage of a year end speech Thursday to rap Halton Renaissance Committee and its chairman Ken Campbell.

The criticism of Renalssance was the first of any consequence to be delivered from the board table since the controversial committee came on the education scene early in 1974.

Chairman Priestner described the group as a "major disruptive force."

"It was spawned as the result of an unfortunate incident at one of our schools, which will not happen again. However, the tendency to generalize is a natural human trait and therefore to assume that the system is sick was a natural outcome," he said.

"We attempted as fairly as possible to listen to this group and act on their constructive criticism. After all, members of this committee have the same rights as any other citizens of Halton - no more,

"Recent incidents lead me certain individuals within it are attempting to undermine the credibility of the public education system with a view to establishing alternative publicly supported systems.

"The continuing attacks on members of our administrative group cannot be condoned by the board. They surely are not constructive. I repeat to the Renaissance Committee what I said when we met in this room some months ago, If you sincerely the system you will have our full co-operation. If, on the other hand, when an in-dividual sends a personal note to your chairman and he responds with a letter to the media, councillors, M.P.s.
