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### Town continues fight over schools

If it takes a special bill in Ontario legislature to get Norval and Chapel Street schools and land back in the in the past, but he stressed asking for their backing. town's hands, that's what Halton Hills council is going centre and recreation area.

Councillor Ern Hyde, an outspoken advocate for town ownership of the schools, and Councillor Rie Morow sparked a motion calling for a. special bill allowing the lands to revert to the town. The motion was backed by every member of council.

Halton Hills council is spearheading the fight for every municipality in Halton Region, Included in the motion asked the legislation include all the municipalities and all schools no longer used for educational purposes.

Stymied by the appraised price, obtained by the education board, rumored to be in excess of quarter of a million dollars for Chapel Street school alone, the negotiating committee of Councillors Mike Armstrong, Len Coxe, Pat McKenzie and Ernie Sykes, had reported no progress to council, earlier this year.

The motion pointed out the schools were paid for by the taxpayers of Esquesing and Georgetown respectively, and were turned over to the Halton Board of Education for nothing . free of any debt.

Hyde and Morrow's motion improvement paid for by the Board after they took over the buildings and land.

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
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
