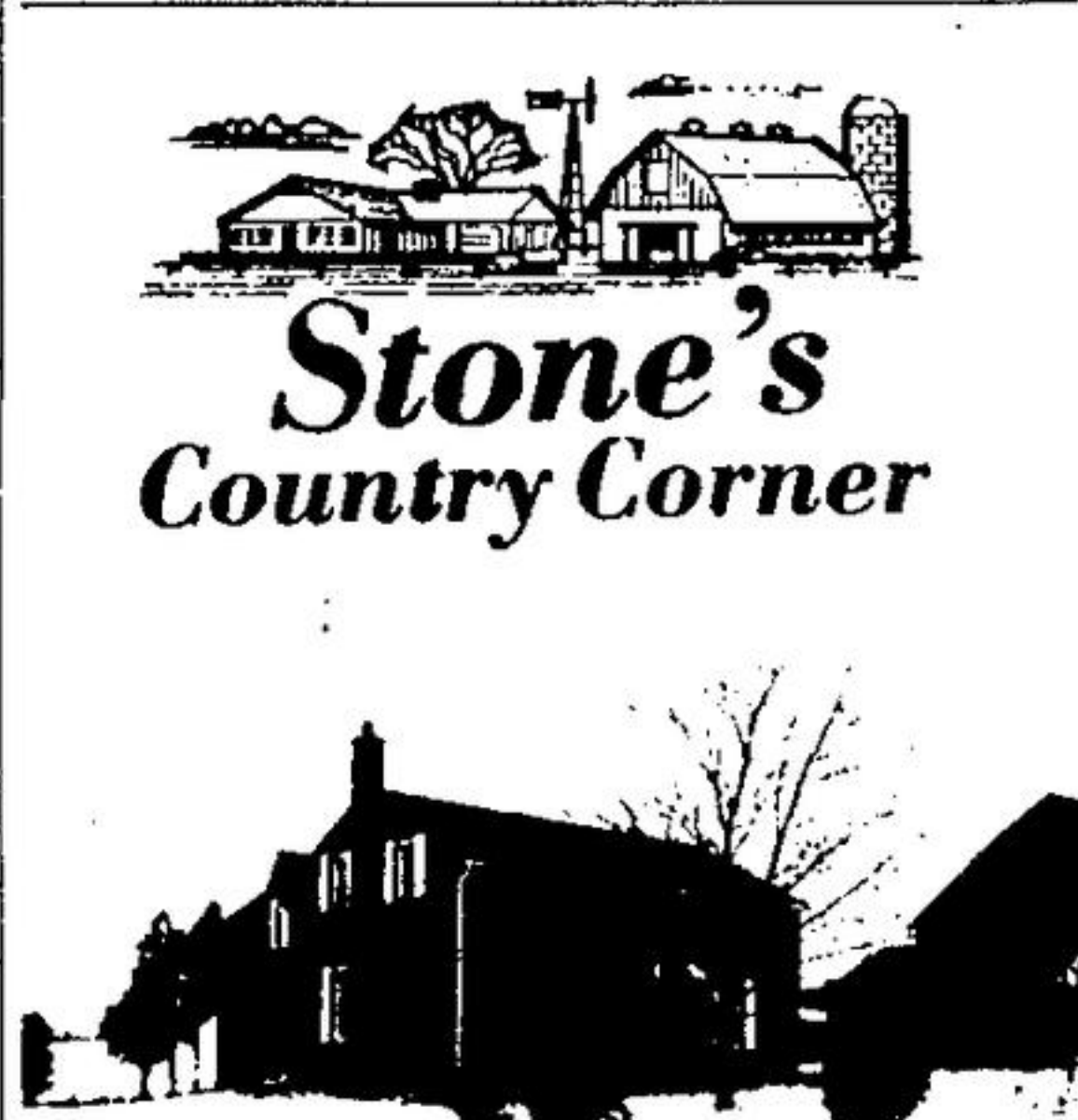

## Bad year for cattle

Beef producers from Halton and Peel met for their annual meeting on Thursday, Jan. 16 at the Junior Farmer Building in Brampton. Ross Beatty of Stayner, a past president of the Ontario Association, was guest speaker.

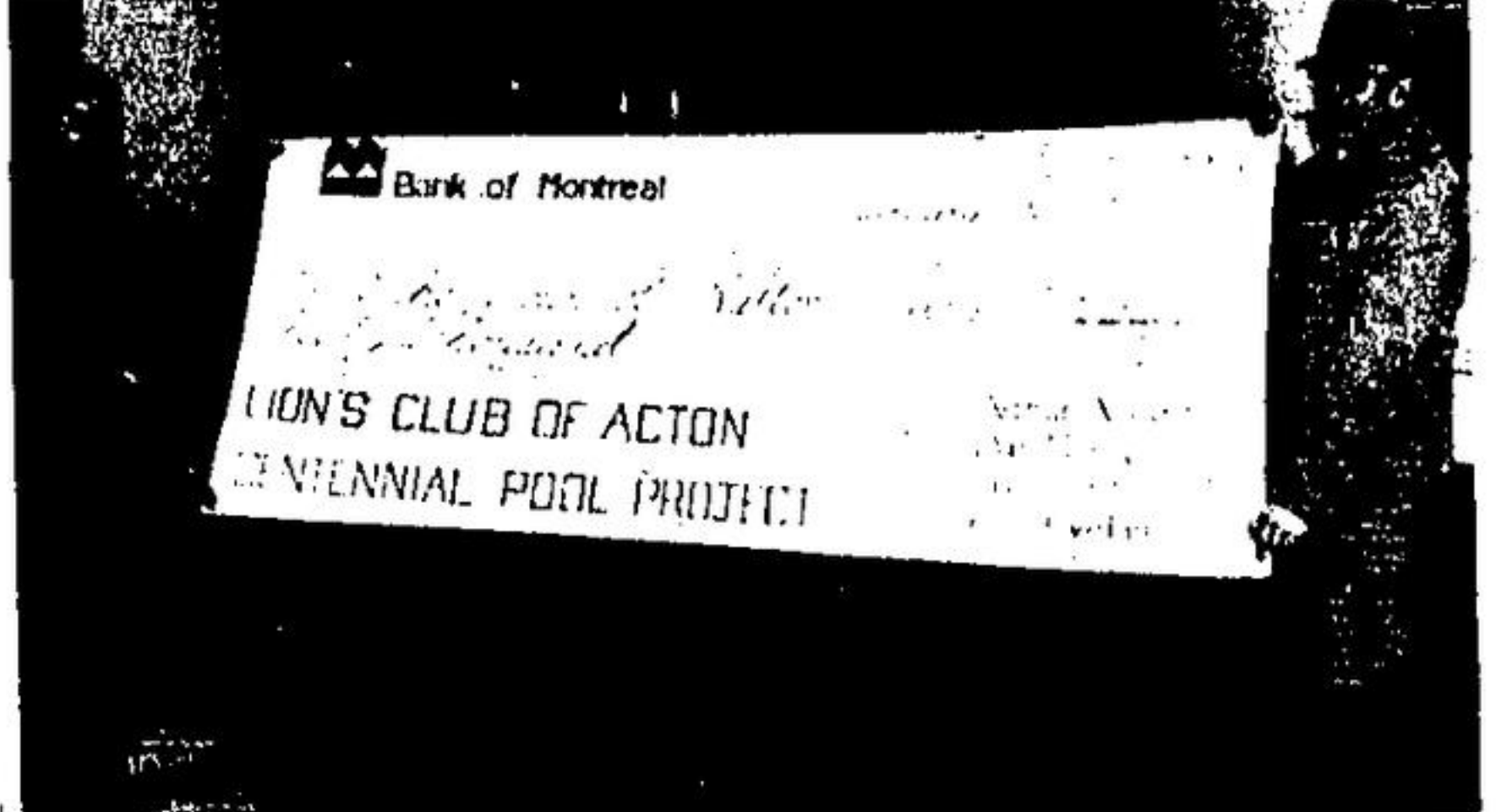
He stated that 1974 will be a year well remembered by cattlemen. The year started with feedlots filled with the highest priced calves in history; many new producers bought beef cows at the highest price ever; feed grain prices were the highest ever; and interest rates were at record levels.

Producers had been told over the previous year or two, expand as fast as possible as there was a world shortage of beef. Then in 1974 the bottom fell out of the beef market. This was a very depressing experience for many beef producers with many leaving the beef industry to try to make a living in some other segment of agriculture. Mr. Beatty felt that the beef problems have not happened due to too much government interference - interference in the movement of cattle between Canada and

the United States, improper assessment of the world beef into the beef cow farming, etc.

Better management of beef producers must be optimistic and think positively, stated Mr. Beatty. They must use the best management possible if they are to survive in order to get a good feed conversion of 7:1 rather than 9:1 as some beef producers are obtaining. Every one pound of grain that you can save per pound of gain on a yearling steer will return 28 lbs. to the beef producer. Lice are stealing more gain than anything else in most feedlots. Producers should cut horns off all calves before they are sold and castrate all males. This can mean a difference of 7-lb per pound at sale time.
