

Hetter management Beef producers must be optimistic and think positively, stated Mr. Beatty. They must use the best management possible if they are to survive in order to get a good feed conversion of 7:1 rather than 9:1 as some beef producers are obtaining. Every one pound of grain that you can save per pound of gain on a yearling steer will return 28 lbs. to the beef producer. Lice are stealing more gain than anything else in most feedlots.
