Surrounding residents signed a petition objecting to the closure and 10 appeared before council. Spokesman Frank Trotter said the group opposed the change in designated land use, and were afraid the closure might diminish future alternative if there were changes in the township road system in future years, a change that might benefit not only those close by but also the rest of the township.

.Mr. Barbour stated it was not feasible to put a road across the land, a road that would bypass present road hazards only to create others more dangerous.

Council decided to refer the matter to the township solicitor before making any decision.
