

# Sabres enjoy goal feast in playoff lid-lifter



PENETANG goalies John Duval and Wilf Guthrie saw nothing but white sweaters Friday

night, as the Sabres clobbered the Hurons 17-2 in their Central Ontario Junior "C" playoff opener

Acton Sabres need only a win at home this Friday night to wrap up their best of five Central Ontario Junior "C" group semi-final series against the Penetang Hurons.

Sabres romped to a 17-2 triumph here Friday, then sked out a 4-3 win in Penetang Sunday afternoon to take a two game lead. Bradford Vaseys lead Alliston Hornets 2-0 in their best of seven series, following 8-1 and 6-5 victories last week.

The Acton club and Brian Beaumont in particular completely demoralized Penetang in the first period of Friday's game in front of a disappointing playoff crowd of 253.

Playing heads-up hockey, Sabres jumped into a 4-0 lead before the halfway point of the first period. Penetang starting goalie John Duval suffered a wrenched neck trying to stop the fourth Acton goal, a picture play with Doug Patten cashing in a perfect pass from rookie Ed Lange. With Duval on the sidelines, Sabres found replacement Wilf Guthrie an easy mark, scoring three more times in the first, three in the second and seven in the third.

Beaumont led Acton scorers with five goals, four of them coming in the first period. Steve Quisenberry scored three goals, Mark McCauley, John Swan and Doug Patten two each and Pete Fendley, Charlie McRae, Gary Saul and Ed Lange one apiece.

Penetang marksmen were Chris Lyons and Bob Moreau. Four recruits called up from the fine Penetang midget team, which recently won the "A" division title at the Silver Stick tournament kept the score much tighter in a close-checking game Sunday.

Midgets Mike Orser, Ken Cowan and Brian Pilon scored the Penetang goals. Hurons also had their best player Brian Duquette back in uniform.

Brian Beaumont's goal in the third period was the game winner, although the Sabre hero for the day was rookie centre Dave Chapman, who finally had his season-long hard work pay off for him in three goals. Chapman scored two of his goals, while Sabres were playing shorthanded.

Penetang took the lead in the game and Sabres had to come from behind a one goal deficit three times. Attendance in Penetang was less than 100.

Hobin Inceon played goal for Acton Friday and Ray Dunbar was in the nets for Sunday's game. Rick Bonette is likely to get the call for Friday night's third game here.

If Sabres wrap up the series, they could start with the Alliston-Bradford winner early next week. A Penetang win would force a fourth game in Penetang Monday

## Rap AHS midgets for childish conduct

Acton High's fine midget boys basketball team has been withdrawn from further competition in the Halton high schools conference by school officials as a disciplinary measure.

The surprise move came as a direct result of the childish conduct of most of the players on the bus bringing the team back from a game at Burlington's M.M. Robinson High School last Wednesday. Earlier in the season certain players on the team had been reprimanded for abuse of game officials.

Rick McArthur, who coaches both the midget and junior teams told the Free Press that three midget players not involved in last week's incident, Brad Buchanan, Don Coats and Jim Matthews will be allowed to play the rest of the season with the junior team.

The midgets blew an 11 point lead and lost their game to Robinson 56-51, in spite of 31 point effort by Paul Bowen. Don Coats added 8, Gord Bruce 7 and John Nessel 5.

Robinson's Rams also won the junior game 69-34. Brian Larsen led Acton scorers with 15 points, Rick Van Fleet scored 18, Dan Webster 6 and Marvin McNabb 2.

Just two days earlier the midgets had won their third conference game of the season 66-52 over Oakville Trafalgar. Gord Bruce scored

17 points in that game. Paul Bowen and Brad Buchanan netted 14 each. Don Coats 13, John Nessel 6 and Pete Zions 3.

Brian Larsen's 24 point scoring spree was not enough to save the juniors from a 76-46 defeat. Dan Webster added 10 points for the junior Redmen.

When they concentrated on basketball, the midgets had represented the school very well, losing only two pre-season games, winning the Fergus tournament at Christmas time and holding their own against the top teams in the tough Halton conference, where they had won three games and lost two more by less than five points.

The winless junior Redmen, plus Buchanan, Coats and Matthews will close out their season against the conference leaders, Burlington Central in Burlington today (Wednesday).
