Black Creek study received by council

Problems of water quality indicate although there is in the Black Creek are minimal flow in the creek the outlined in a report received from the Ministry of the Environment by the town of Halton Hills. The review of the receiving water capacity of the Black Creek follows a proposal to expand the sewage treatment plant beyond its present capacity. The report, which had been requested by the town, was received and filed last week.

A review of information collected in 1973 and 1974

reveals an unusually complex water quality problem downstream from Acton.

The report makes four points. First is that Beardmore apparently substantially alters the quality of the creek increasing Population ligure committed chlorides.

Beavers too Second point is that the Ministry. The population town sewage treatment plant is having a minimal effect on the creek because of its high degree of treatment. Third is that the type of impact on the creek from Beardmore and the sewage treatment plant is largely unrelated. Last point made is that beaver activity on Black Creek is resulting in water quality problems.




