Among all drugs, alcohol is the number one problem-creating factor. A story by Sidney Katz says that the breathalyzer test has failed, the killing goes on. There are not enough police to take the drunken drivers off the road; only one in 700 is liable to be picked up. Often others cover up for the drinker, but his work will suffer, his children may be deprived of what they need. In Toronto, there is a staff of 14 watching and waiting to catch traffickers in drugs. Young people to-day are going to the "adult" drug. It is important to instill in little people the knowledge that will cause them to make the right decision at the right time. There is the well known story of the lad, who was

hired to work in a potato factory. His job was to put the potatoes in three different bags, according to their size. After two days, he quit. He told the boss he just couldn't stand making all those decisions. The Drug and Alcohol Concern Centre has about 100 volunteers working to alleviate drug problems.
