

Winter ice program at Community Centre

The Acton Community Centre is doing brisk business once again, with their winter

ice program in full swing.

The arena is used all week long by various groups and individuals for work-outs, games and public skating. Manager Harold Townsley

listed several groups who rent the ice on a regular basis. These include Legion Minor Hockey, the Waterloo-Wellington League, the Figure Skating Club, Junior C Hockey and the Industrial League.

Fifteen hours a week are also set aside for individual industrial groups who wish to use the ice.

17 employees Apart from the manager, there are 17 other employees. Mr. Townsley has hired seven people (six full-time and one part-time) to do all types of jobs. There are six girls in the refreshment booth, one ticket taker and three "rink rats".

Due to the constant buildup of Ice, the rink is "shaved down" every second week. The markings take quite a beating as well, so they are repainted every two weeks

The cost for renting the Ice varies from group to group. The Waterloo-Wellington league is charged \$10 an hour for Atom, Novice and Peewee teams and \$14 for Bantam, Midget and Juvenile. The Industrial League pays \$20 an

Out of town groups are charged \$22.50.

Rates for the Figure Skating Club are \$10 an hour. The ice is also available to individual figure skaters for \$5 an hour. This is for one

person only.

Junior C Hockey receives 60 per cent of the ticket money and one free hour of practice a week, with the rest of the gate money going to the arena. Their games are played on Fridays, beginning

On Thursdays from 1.40 to 3.40 p.m. the ice is set aside for the "Mothers and Tots"

Public skuting
