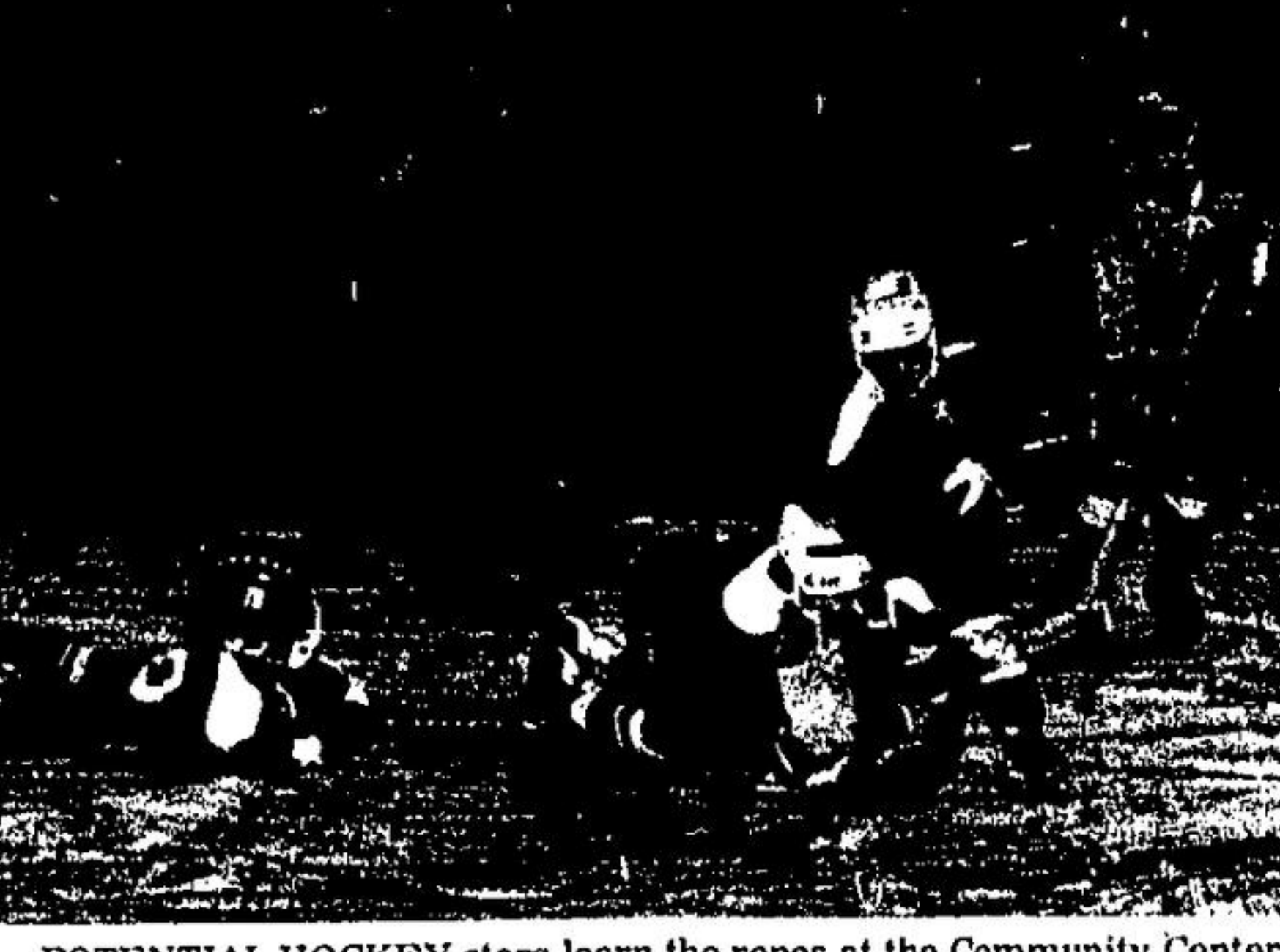

Winter ice program at Community Centre

The Acton Community Centre is doing brisk business once again, with their winter ice program in full swing. The arena is used all week long by various groups and individuals for work-outs, games and public skating. Manager Harold Townsley listed several groups who rent the ice on a regular basis. These include Legion Minor Hockey, the Waterloo-Wellington League, the Figure Skating Club, Junior C Hockey and the Industrial League.
Fifteen hours a week are also set aside for individual industrial groups who wish to use the ice.
Apart from the manager, there are 17 other employees. Mr. Townsley has hired seven people (six full-time and one part-time) to do all types of jobs. There are six girls in the refreshment booth, one ticket taker and three "rink rats".
Due to the constant buildup of ice, the rink is "shaved down" every second week. The markings take quite a beating as well, so they are replaced every two weeks also.
The cost for renting the ice varies from group to group. The Waterloo-Wellington league is charged \$10 an hour for Atom, Novice and Pee-wee teams and \$14 for Bantam, Midget and Juvenile. The Industrial League pays \$20 an hour.
On Thursdays from 1.30 to 3.40 p.m. the ice is set aside for the "Mothers and Tots" group.
Public skating
Public skating hours are Saturdays, 9.15 to 11.15 p.m., and Sundays, 1.40 to 3.40 p.m. According to Mr. Townsley, the turn-out for public skating is usually minimal.
The refreshment stand has its peak activity on Tuesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

Province to keep assessing function

On the basis of discussions he had, the treasurer indicated any return of that function was unlikely. In fact he termed the issue "a dead duck".
Regional council had earlier supported the return of that function. At that time councilors felt a better job could be done locally. Municipal officials have often complained about the tardiness the provincial officials demonstrate in getting new assessment on the rolls. There is provision now for retroactive collection of taxes that were missed. In the early days of the provincial assessment department there was no such recourse.
The treasurer noted that when the assessment function was taken over by the province a few years ago, administration costs were in the order of \$17,000,000 and had now climbed to \$50,000,000 annually. "You know how a bureaucracy grows," he said.
