Fees jump for GRCA

New fees have been established for users of Grand River Conservation Authority (GRCA) parks this year. The hikes were included in a budget in excess of \$14 million passed recently by the GRCA.

Vehicle entry costs will rise to \$2 daily from \$1.50 weekdays. On weekends, fees will be \$1.75 with bus entry set at \$10 from \$7. Season passes are up from \$20 to \$25 and overnight campers will pay \$4. Last year's campers paid \$3.50.

Firewood costs have jumped from 50¢ per unit to \$1 and swimming pool facilities for children at Blynd and Brant parks will cost 25¢. Fees for boat launching, shelters and hydro use were not increased.

Choral Society plans March trip to Austria

Preparations are in the making and on March 26 the Eramosa Choral Society will fly to Austria. They will be ten-day guests of the Salzburg Sierwascher folk group who visited Guelph last October. While there, they will sing at various church functions and schools.

Composed of 45 Wellington County school members, the youth group has worked industriously to raise funds towards their trip, arranging

concerts and dances on which they have sold tickets. The Society received a grant from the Ontario Department of Education for the Austria venture. This is the first time the grant has been given to a group two years in a row.

At their going-away concert, scheduled for March 23 at Trinity United church in Guelph, Alice Fair will accompany the choir for music by Canadian composers. The

Ontario Arts Council is bringing organist, Dr. Melville Cook from Metropolitan United church, Toronto, to accompany the choir for the Easter section of the Messiah.

Also included in the choir's busy agenda of performances prior to their trip, is a presentation at Timothy Eaton Memorial church, Toronto on Sunday, March 9 when Dr. David Gucltertony will be the organist. On March 14 a concert and hymn-sing will be held at Harriston Presbyterian church.

Praised The Eramosa Choral Society recently received three firsts and one second at the Kiwanis music festival held in Toronto. Adjudicator, Mrs. Phyllis Thomson, a music educator from Winnipeg, praised the group highly.

U.C.W. plans workshop for all

Time, date and place has been set for a one-day workshop which will be sponsored by the United Church Women (U.C.W.). It is one open for men and women of all church denominations wishing to attend and will be held Friday, April 11 at Knox United church in Ayr. Hours are from 9:30 a.m. until 3 in the afternoon.

Theme of the day will be Quality of Land and Life: Use or Abuse? Organizers feel it is one which should stimulate a great deal of thought and hopefully culminate in constructive planning for further workshops.

Plans To paint the picture as to land uses and their effects on developing growing rural communities, an audio-visual program prepared by Rev. Peter McKellar is planned. A panel will be on hand to inform those attending about the technical use of land, planning or developing and views of politicians. Members will have an opportunity to question and discuss information given.

Purpose of the workshop is for church members to discover what role they can play and how best they can apply their findings. The need to reconcile differences in people relationships; how to identify a quality of life; the way to open doors of communications toward better urban-rural understanding will be some of the topics brought out by the panelists.
