Stewarttown school snowmobile course engages all students

As part of the school's physical and health education curriculum, Stewarttown senior public school held a unique snowmobile clinic last week that simulated actual winter conditions the snow-

mobilers might meet—and the whole school participated. The clinic was operated in conjunction with Provincial Constable L. Scott, community services officer for the Ontario Provincial Police. He

was assisted by Constable Jim Bain, and Thelma Hearn and Jim Ridley, both physical education teachers. Parents who assisted included Doug Farragan, from White, Mrs. Charette and Mrs. Malby.

Constable Scott started the clinic with a slide presentation followed by a questionnaire which the entire school wrote, regarding the Motorized Snow Vehicles Act, which Constable Scott considered even gave O.P.P. officers considerable trouble. There were 33 true and false questions to be answered which covered rules and regulations for snow vehicles.

Following the questionnaire 195 of the students who had written permission from parents mounted snowmobiles in the school yard where a course had been set up which simulated actual conditions which snowmobilers could expect to meet.

Judges were stationed at various points to mark scores. Contestants had to negotiate a tunnel, cross a railroad, highway, drive under nighttime conditions and follow a circuitous, well-marked course, among other tests.

Snowmobiles for the tests were loaned by Muri Allison, Ashgrove Outdoor Power Products and Gordon's Service Centre, Ashgrove.

Constable Scott said the students were handling the tests very well in spite of the lack of snow over the course.

Constable Scott will be conducting similar clinics at other schools in the future as conditions permit including one at Milton and another at Acton.

Principal Jack Reed of Stewarttown school said the course was part of the physical health and education classes at the school. He felt it was an important part of the curriculum since many of the school's students use or will be using snow machines.

Farmers bombard land policy

Ontario Federation of Agriculture President Gordon Hill came into Halton Thursday for his second hearing session with Halton farmers within a month.

Farmers picked up where they left off a few weeks ago and continued bombarding OFA's proposed land use policy.

One woman described the policy as a "death warrant" for farmers. She said many farmers didn't expect to farm forever and they might want to sell out.

Another spokesman argued that the province was only interested in keeping the value of land such as that in North Halton out of development until it was prepared to develop it and then securing the land at bottom dollar.

That spokesman was determined the land in North Halton would be developed in time. "You can't stop development here as the population grows," he said.

He predicted the government would buy one or two farms at agricultural prices and then have claimed to set the market value.

"Is it fair to keep land in agriculture and have the government take the gravel?" he said.

Mr. Hill suggested there was nothing unfair about it, providing the landowner is compensated for taking it out of development.

Compensation Hill argued that farmers would have to face land use planning in one form or the other. "The only real question is do you want compensation and some input, or are you ready to accept what someone else does?"

The OFA leader told farmers there wasn't much enthusiasm about compensation schemes around Queen's Park. He suggested farmers should be showing more support for the idea of compensation.

"You won't get it unless you want it and are willing to fight for it." He urged farmers to get the ear of the MPPs, municipal councils and reporters in an effort to convince society of the need for compensation.

The leader said he wasn't prepared to recommend any part of the package the OFA had developed unless the whole package could be adopted.

Want guarantees Farmers attending recent meetings in Halton have been adamant that some guarantee of compensation should come from the government prior to the farmers agreeing to a land freeze in permanent agriculture.

Several have suggested OFA shouldn't be making any proposals that concerned land freezes. George Pelletier, a well known Milton area farmer, told Hill

it would be better to wait until the province moved with a land use policy and then argue the farmers wouldn't accept unless compensation was awarded. "You'd be in a better bargaining position," he told Hill.

Many farmers in the province, especially those living in urban shadows know that some day in the future their land will be "ripe" for development and they are anxious to cash in.

Down the drain "You'll break farmers if you push this thing through. There goes the life savings right down the drain," one farmer told Hill.

Bill Johnson, a member of GUARD and the Ontario Garbage Coalition used the meeting as a forum to ask the OFA chief about his stand on dumping garbage on agricultural lands or near water-courses.

Mr. Hill said OFA was opposed to both actions and noted the Federation had taken a very strong stand against metropolitan areas planning to dump garbage in rural municipalities.

28 homes rejected

A development of 28 single family homes at Lot 1, Con. 8, was given short shrift by Halton Hills planning board Tuesday night.

J. Shaw of Norshaw Developments Ltd said he planned to dedicate two acres of park land to the town, and would build two tennis courts and a change house but he would not maintain them.

The planning board rejected the proposal, saying it was prime agricultural land.

Mr. Shaw fared a little better on a second proposal. He said he planned an industrial development on part of Lot 6, Con. 3.

Mr. Shaw said he had commitments with three companies who were waiting to locate.

Snow plays postman

Jim Snow, MPP for Halton East and Minister of Government Services, is playing for persons wishing to correspond with Queen's Park while normal postal channels are interrupted.

The minister said this week that any mail properly addressed to the government Ontario Government department may be left for daily pickups at his Hornby home, or at the Oakville municipal offices.

His home is located on the old Seventh Line Rd., one-half mile north of Hornby P. O., and across the road from Horny Towers Golf Club.

The Oakville office is on Trafalgar Rd. north of the Queen Elizabeth Way.

Mr. Snow said the special mail service was established following complaints from many local residents, and will remain in operation until Canada Post's current labor difficulties in Toronto cease.
