**Big decisions
Rockwood trustees**

Lou Hills, a resident was at the meeting and told the board he can see \$10,000 worth of work to be put into

the building. Trustees are wondering about feasibility of repairing the hall at high costs if, when the Lions Club complex opens up, it could put the village town hall out of business anyway.

Conversion
Conversion of the old fire hall into a permanent hydro office building was also discussed. Chairman Allan Osborne said there'd been no firm decision made on keeping the hydro office there, but asked advice of the health inspector. Mr. Ristan talked about chemical toilets as opposed to incinerator types, either of which would be required.

Necessity of water supply was also discussed. The trustees said they'd have to hook up to a neighboring well to get water for the building. Again costs of updating the firehall seemed to outweigh the convenience.

Present at the meeting was Monty Root of Guelph St. Mr. Root had submitted a letter to the board requesting that he be allowed to purchase the building as protection for his own property. The proposal meshed with the feeling of the evening. Mr. Hills suggested to council that the monies gained from the sale could help finance a more adequate building at a better location in the village.

Next move
B. Cleary of Guelph St., owner of the building in which the hydro office was located before the recent fire, approached the board. He asked for their decision on whether they were going to renew their lease on his office for Rockwood Hydro.

Trustees weighed the immediate costs of bringing the firehall up to standards. They decided to take up a new lease on the Cleary office. Mr. Cleary said everything had been repaired and put back into shape after the fire. Trustees voted unanimously to make to move to the former hydro office, within the next few days.

Town buys oil

The town is buying 2,000 gallons of road oil to keep dust down on rural roads this summer.

Last year the town used 37,000 gallons of the oil but this year all they can get is 25,000 gallons.

The price of this oil has gone up to 23 cents a gallon this year from 15 cents a gallon last year.

Largest centre in the far north is Inuvik, a town of 3,000 near the mouth of the Mackenzie River. So they will not melt the permafrost, buildings must be on wooden piles or a pad of gravel.

This year the Federal Government has included many new tax benefits that are important to you because they could save you money. Your federal income Tax Guide explains them thoroughly. This year for the first time, if you received and reported on your income tax form interest income from many legitimate Canadian sources, including bank deposits, bonds, mortgages and notes, you are allowed to claim as a deduction the total of the amounts up to \$1,000. Your Tax Guide explains it in detail. Check Item 35. Increased Personal Exemptions is another item that has changed from last year. All it means is that the Federal Government has increased your personal exemptions to coincide with the rise in the Consumer Price Index. The new personal exemptions are printed on your income tax form. Guide Item 41 tells you more about it.
