

Double trailer fee

Same services as rural residents

Halton Hills council are satisfied residents of trailers and mobile homes receive exactly the same services as residents in the rural areas of the town, so decided \$20 a month licence fee was warranted.

Councillor Roy Booth questioned the increase from \$10 to \$20 saying he wondered if it wasn't too much for a unit measuring 700 square feet. He said the property itself is taxed, and is little more than the size of the trailer.

"In comparison to a 1200 square foot house, with garbage, police and light services, it seems a lot," Booth stated.

He claimed they were paying three quarters the tax without having water and sewers. Booth said he understood some of it would go to school costs, but wondered if anyone had ever looked into the actual costs.

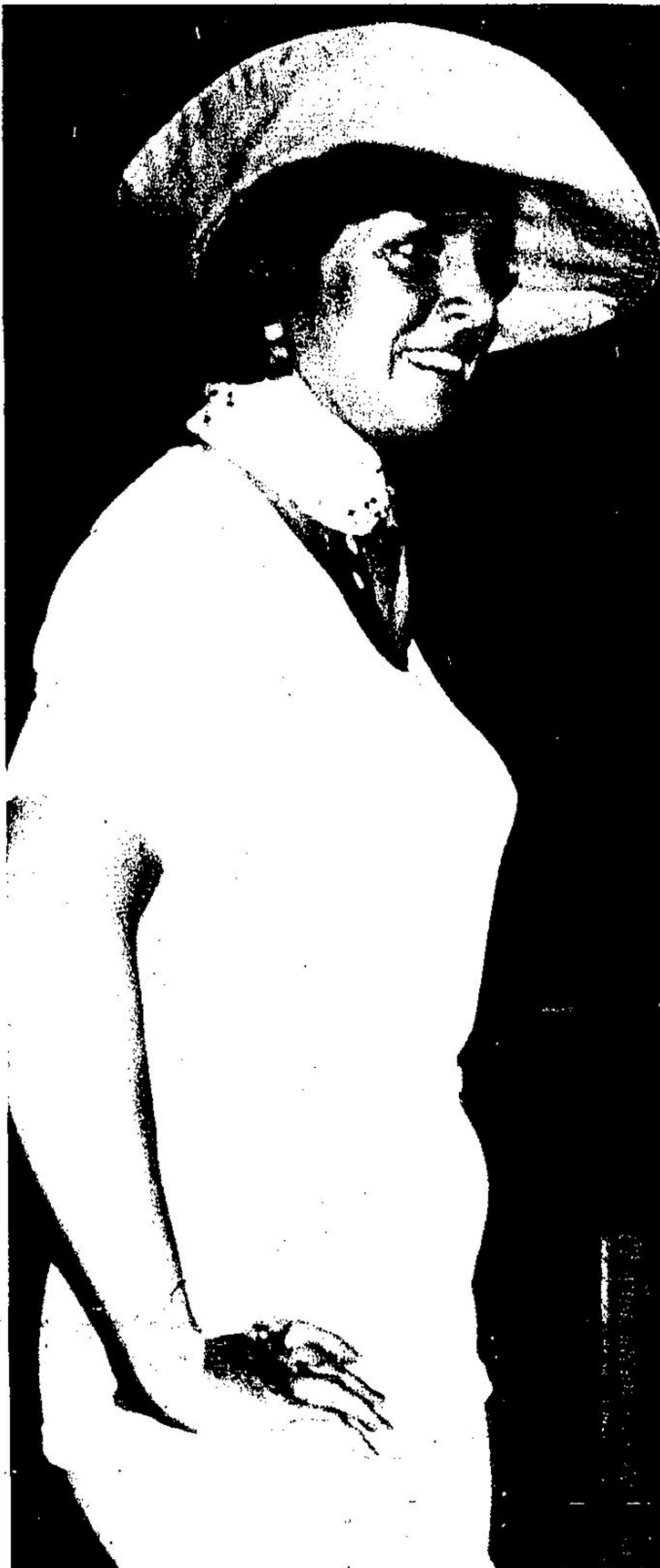
Mayor Tom Hill pointed out they were receiving exactly the same services as rural residents of Esqueping.

Booth replied the land area could not be compared. "They aren't second class citizens, they have the right to live here the same as anyone else."

Councillor Russell Miller emphasized the residents of mobile homes have education, recreation and roads as municipal services, the same as any Ward Two resident. He contended they would be assessed almost the same, and would be paying the same taxes, as a house of that size in the rural area.

Councillor Harry Levy pointed out the \$10 licence fee has been in force since 1956, and claimed it was time the residents should pay their share of the same benefits as the rural residents.

Seemingly convinced, Booth voted, along with the rest of council in favor of the \$20 licence fee.

Raise questioned by 2 councillors

Councillors Pat MacKenzie and Harry Levy are not in favor of a 13 cent pay increase for the George Herrington's Canine Control. Mr. Herrington is paid 67 cents per year for every person living in Halton Hills and would like this increased to 80 cents per person. He made his request at the last finance meeting on March 10.

"I'm certainly not going to raise his wage 13 cents at this time," Mr. Levy told the other members of the finance committee on Monday evening. "We gave him the 67

cents last year for what he is asking for now."

"I thought he received a reasonable increase last year," Councillor MacKenzie remarked.

Councillor Levy agrees with Mr. MacKenzie that to give him the 13 per cent increase at this time, is not feasible. He would like to see a report from last year's costs and controls as compared to 1973 before any agreement on the matter is settled.

When Mr. Herrington appeared before the committee on the 10th, he explained he had increased his staff by two men, installed radios in his trucks and could not cope with the sharp increase of gas prices.

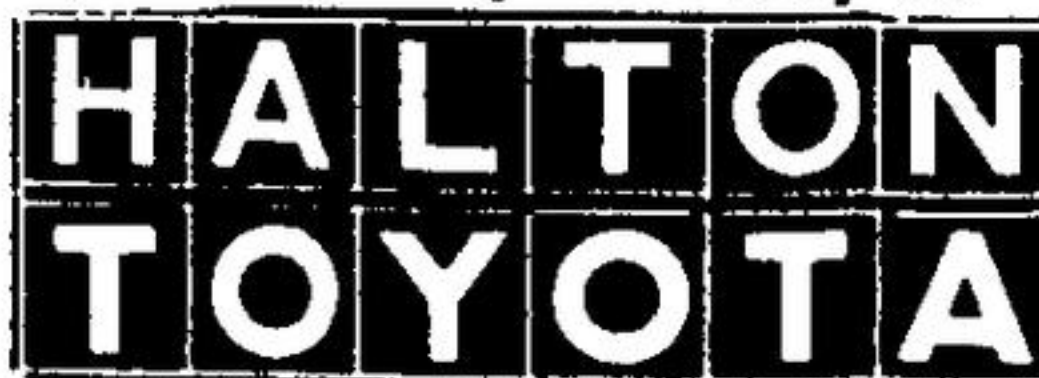
