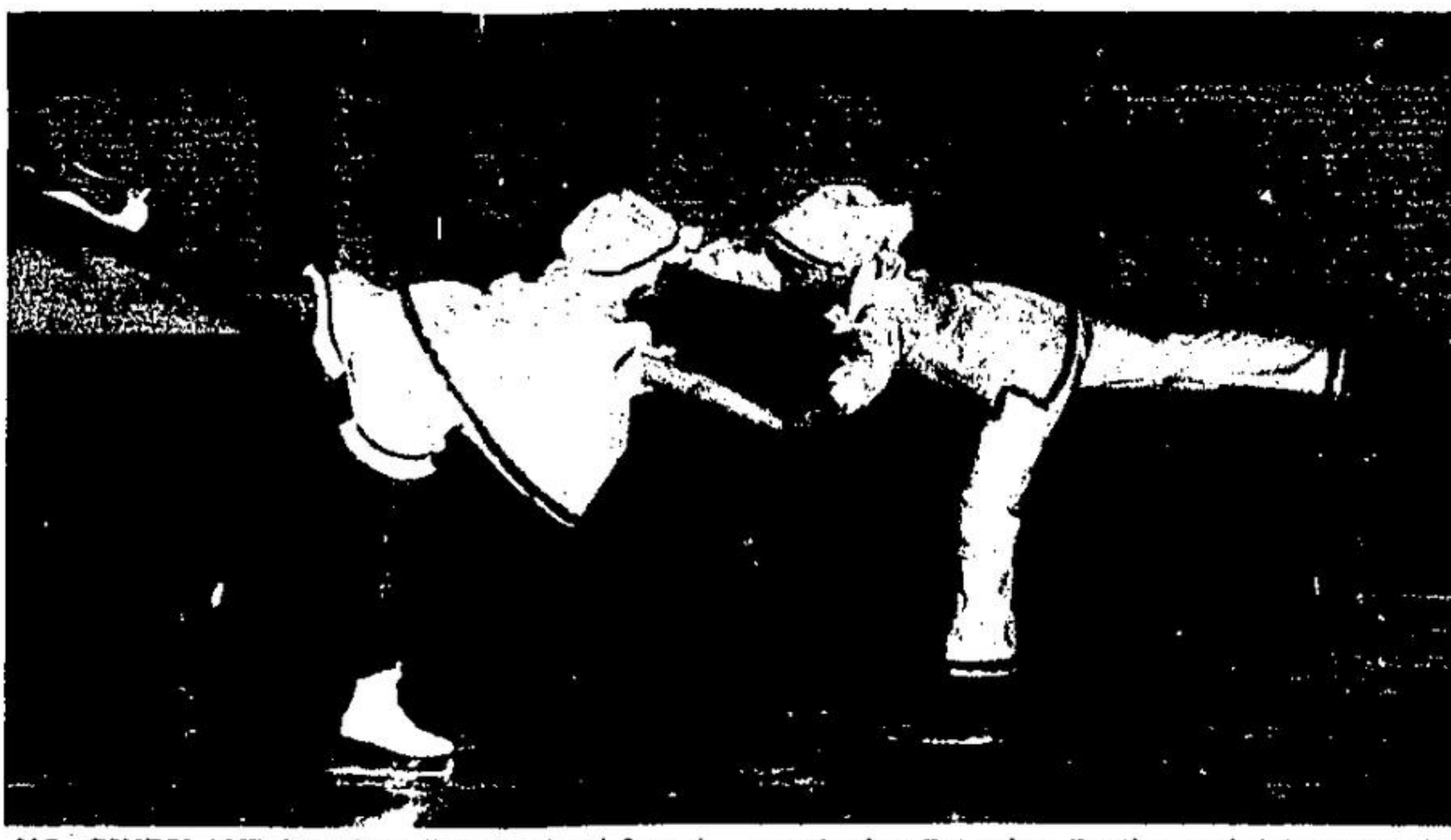

## Council lets consultants appear at works committee

Councillor Harry Levy must not trust consultants any more than Councillor Ern Hyde does. For a few weeks now, Hyde has been bucking the idea of letting consultants come to talk to Halton Hills works committee about setting up maintenance management in the town. At Monday's council meeting Levy judged the same complaint. He said it was a waste of time to hear the consultants since the town probably wasn't going to go for maintenance management. Council was discussing the works committee decision to invite two consulting firms to a meeting to make their pitch. Councillor Mike Armstrong noted it was the works committee's time that would be wasted and some mem-

bers of the committee wanted to hear the consultants. He reminded the councillors they would each receive a report of the meeting and the consultant's report and no money would be spent. Armstrong and councillor Len Cox both said it wouldn't cost anything to listen to the consultants so what was the harm in hearing them. Councillor Ernie Sykes suggested the consultants should talk to the entire council, not just the works committee. Mayor Tom Hill said it should go to works first since that is the procedure with all the other committees. The council decided to go ahead and allow the consultants to talk to works committee.

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## Equipment stays in H. Hills

Halton Hills Council's insistence on keeping two dump trucks and a backhoe that the Halton Region felt it was entitled to, militates against the spirit of regionalism, says Oakville Councillor Bill Mason. He claimed the town couldn't justify keeping the equipment and noted the move would jeopardize the efficiency of the regional works crews. Representatives of the town and regional works committees had agreed at a meeting last week in Halton Hills the equipment would be left with the town but made available to regional crews. Regional Council agreed to honor that agreement. Halton Hills Councillor Len Cox said it was no co-jarve or any attempt to rook the people at the region. "One backhoe did all of the work before, why should we need two now?" Regional Works Chairman Jack Raffis said that both Burlington and Oakville withheld men that were supposed to come to the region earlier. He disputed an earlier claim that the southern towns had been fair in the dealings.

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
