Until 1964 Mr. Meadows used to pick up the mail twice daily at the C.N.R. rallway station. He would then deliver it back to the post office for sorting. At another hour he would pick up the outgoing mail and take it to the station. "At one time there were as many as seven deliveries to the station," he recalled. He explained that deliveries were gradually cut back to only a few until finally, in 1964, it was discontinued completely and truck delivery from Toronto and Guelph was introduced.
