Committee happy with Bell

A comprehensive outline of present and proposed phone rates and mileage charges for Campbellville-area 854 exchange phone subscribers is currently being circulated to 854 customers by the 854 Committee.

Chairman William Johnson said this week the lists are available from Mrs. Grant Fish, Mr. and Mrs. Gerry Webb and Mr. and Mrs. Loeher Mrs. They are also on display at the offices of The Canadian Champion, Milton and The Acton Free Press.

Mr. Johnson said he was "jubilant" about Bell Canada's offer to increase the toll-free calling area for 854 subscribers, even though it means a small rate increase. "If the average person spends \$2 a month on long distance phone calls, it won't really cost him any more. We'll be better off than Acton subscribers," he said.

States go up
Campbellville customers will soon be able to phone free of Georgetown, Acton, Burlington and Oakville if they vote for the proposal in Bell's current mail ballot, he said. Basic private phone rates will increase \$1.20 per month and the mileage rate will go up 15 cents per quarter mile in the spring of 1976. Semi-private subscribers will have a rate increase of 95 cents per month plus 10 cents per quarter mile mileage charge.

Another increase is possible in the fall of 1976, adding \$1 a month for private phones.

The ballot needs a 60 per cent "yes" vote and Johnson hopes everyone will approve it.

Even the spring increase in "iffy" he said, as some 854 customers will be moved to Burlington exchange and rates are based on the number of phones a subscriber can call toll-free.
