graduate in social sciences. His great versatility has taken him into many fields of working as a teacher in the arts and sciences as well as recreation leadership. In 1961 he founded Jeunes Voyageurs Canadiens, a travel-study program for junior and senior high school students.

He served as teacher, trustee on the North York Board of Education, and viceobsirman of the Metro school board. In 1967 he resigned his positions in Toronto to accept the principalship of York House school in Vancouver. During the following three years he was successful in gulding the school as an outward-bound institution stressing strong student part-
