

All the ducks kept penned during the past weeks are now gone, according to arena manager Harold Townsley. The hybrid ducks have been culled from the flock, and the wild ducks have been let loose at several locations including Bronte and Guelph.

Several hundred ducks had been wintering at the dam on Fairy Lake over Beardmore's water intake. Some 70 or 80 were trapped and kept in a barn in hopes of improving the quality of Beardmore water.


Collison said he was working with the Acton club to draw up time schedules, and by-laws. "I hope the courts are avai-
