

Acton Sabres have requested an OHA Junior "C" conveners' meeting to explore the possibility of realigning groups to reduce unecessary travelling next season.

Sabres are interested in bringing New Hamburg and neighboring clubs into a group along with Acton, Alliston, Schomberg, Stayner and Bradford of the present Central group. A new Junior "C" entry from Orangeville, which now has not only an excellent hockey building, but also the players to go with it, is a good bet. Orangeville juveniles copped the OMHA Juvenile "A" championship this year.

Penetang, Bracebridge and Huntsville are apparently ready to return to a revised edition of the old Muskoka-Georgian Bay loop, with a new entry from Parry Sound, which now has a new arena.

Sabre attendance was down a total of 1000 for the regular season this year, but the cost of bus trips to the three northern towns was the major blow to the team treasury. This was in spite of the fact the Huntsville and Bracebridge clubs showed Acton fans some most exciting hockey on their single visits here.

Average attendance for 20 Sabre home games, including exhibitions, regular season and playoff games was 292.

Gary Vasey has his club in Bradford up for sale, with a price tag of \$1500 hanging on it. Although the talent-laden Vaseys have failed twice to win the OHA Junior "C" championship, fan support in Bradford has been super. The club averaged 450 for the regular season and more than 1200 for the three home games of their OHA Junior "C" quarter-final series against Dunn-

Bradford loses only six players to overage, compared to 10 for Acton and a similar number for Alliston, making a Bradford-Stayner pennant race likely again next season. The OHA Junior "D" finalist Siskins expect to have all but two players back in uniform.

Aggravating the Sabre talent loss is this week's announcement from Georgetown that a four man group has applied to the OHA to operate a Junior "B" hockey club there next season. Over the past four seasons Georgetown has been a prime source of Sabre import recruiting.

Sabre defenceman Kent Kentner has received an official invitation from coach Roger Nielson to attend the training camp of the Major Junior "A" Peterborough Petes in the fall.

Bill McGilloway and Steve Buchanan, who suited up with the Junior "B" Guelph Biltmores this season will be shooting for positions on the Mad Hatters' Tier 2 Junior "A" club next season.




