Law licence granted for special functions

Eramosa township councillors held a special meeting last Monday night. It was called to have the municipal auditor explain the 1974 financial statements and general business. Mr. and Mrs. Ray Law and their solicitor, B. Wadsworth appeared before council requesting council's approval of Mr. Law's application to the L.L.B.O. for a dining lounge licence on the lower floor area of his hotel.

The motion was passed that council reconvene and sit as a committee of the whole to consider Mr. Law's application. Reconvening, council passed the following resolution: That, as a result of the advice received from assistant registrar, Mr. I. J. Shirley of the L.L.B.O., the council approves the issuing of a dining lounge licence "for special functions only" for the Colonial hotel, Rockwood, for an additional 163 people in the lower level.

Authorization was given the treasurer to pay accounts of \$27.16 for meals and mileage re trip to Toronto for deputy-reeve Clark, and \$35.62 for meals at Road Tour conference attended by reeve W. H. Adsett; Road superintendent, Robt. Hamilton advised council that the municipality may purchase trees from the Grand River Conservation Authority and that the local Junior Farmers would be interested in the program.

Mr. Howard Simpson C.A., municipal auditor of Robinson, Lott and Brohman was present. He explained the 1974 financial statements to council. He said that the township was in sound financial position. He suggested that if the general surplus was sustained the mill for working funds could be eliminated for the present

Fire chief C. Meadows requested council's permission to purchase two radios. He also asked that members of the department attend conventions and the fire school. Council agreed providing the department were within their budget. Council also confirmed appointment of Frank Allsop as deputy fire chief.

The meeting adjourned until May 5, the next regular meeting date.
