On Friday, April 25 the grade 10 Environmental Science class with Dr. Paul Tamblin went to Kortwright Waterfowl Park in Guelph, to investigate current conservation procedures as they apply to waterfowl.

The trip to Kortwright Waterfowl Park was a practical look at the efforts of the Kortwright Foundation to maintain a sanctuary and research station inside the city limits of Guelph. The students learned that all bottom feeding waterfowl are potential victims of lead poisoning if they eat lead shot pellets from the bottom of marshes. In addition to seeing over 70 different species of waterfowl from Teal to Lesser Canada Geese, the students viewed nesting boxes for wood ducks and a variety of management practices. If anyone is interested in further information on attracting wildlife to your back yard or farm, contact Dr. Tamblin at the High School or Kortwright Station directly.

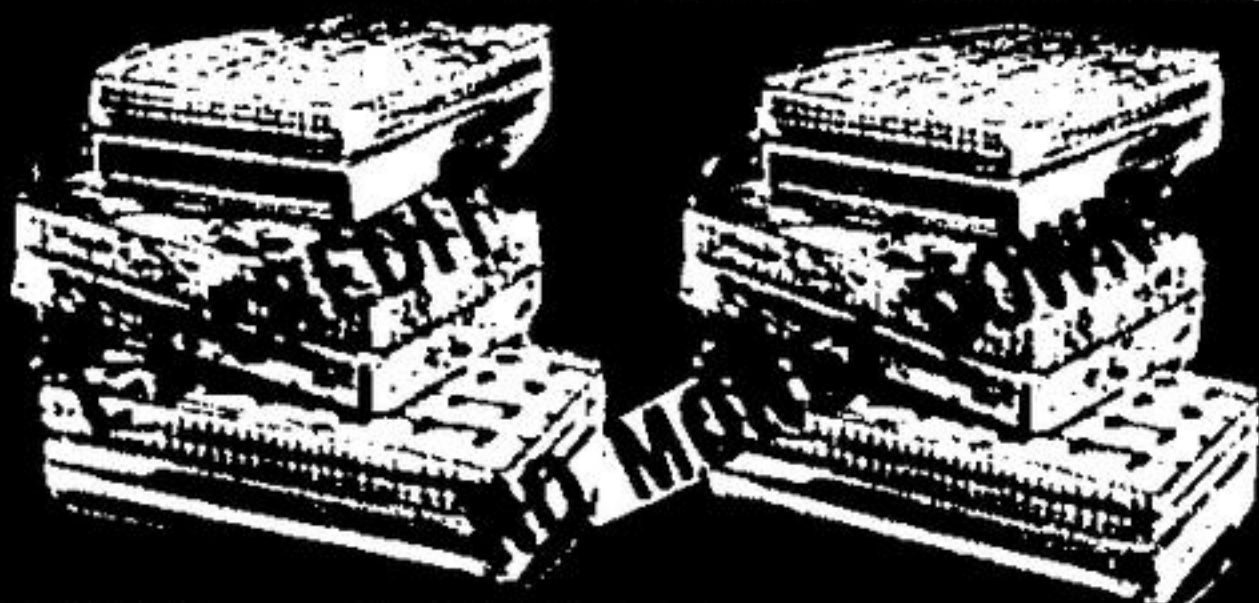
