# Handicap problems discussion

Representatives of the "Friends-In-Deed" the area group for the physical handicapped, are attending a seminar in Halton Centennial Manor on May 13 in preparation for a conference in Toronto on May 22.

Five topics will be discussed by the same number of seminar groups and the problems will be taken to this conference.

The Toronto session is province-wide and seminars are being held throughout the province to help local groups of handicapped people identify their needs.

One of the problems to be brought up by the representatives of Friends-in-Deed is the fact that the handicapped cannot go shopping like ordinary people as they cannot maneuver the curbs on the way to the stores, and the steps once there. Washroom doors are not wide enough for the wheelchairs to get through, and cubicles are not large enough to accommodate wheelchairs. Some medical centres and doctor's offices are unattainable by the handicapped because of the steps leading up to them.




